

## "We are all on the same team and we want to accomplish the same goal."



In August, the Ennis Independent School District (EISD) will open the doors of the new senior high school addition, as well as a new junior high. Greg Burns, the EISD owner's representative, has had a major role in seeing these projects to completion. The EISD wanted to insure that the new school projects were done responsibly.

"They were looking for someone with construction background to coordinate and manage all new construction in the district, insure compliance with all planning and zoning requirements and work with Buddy Markum and Steve Howerton at the city," Greg said. "I'm the 'man-in-the-middle.' I try to make everybody happy."

Greg came on board in May of 2006, setting up the project with a series of checks and balances using the same testing lab that supplied the soils report. The lab monitors the depth of the piers, takes concrete samples and checks the wells and the connections in the structural steel. "As an owner's rep, there is value that I can add to the process. I looked into everything related to the inside of the building, from the wall tiles to the ceiling tiles to the kitchen floor finishes and identified areas that wouldn't work. On the new construction, we have used drilled piers," Greg said.

The new building project involved an architectural design team, SHW and a construction manager, Charter Builders. "My job decreases the school district's risk and the construction manager's risk," Greg explained. An owner's rep is appreciated by architects and building contractors because it gives them a single point of contact. The architects bring their artistic perspective, but the contractors are the ones who have to put it on the ground. "The architect wants things installed according to their design. The contractors suggest opportunities to save money. They both know if they call me I can give them an answer," he added.

Greg has good reason to care about

the quality of Ennis school buildings. His wife, Jessica, teaches at the Sixth Grade Center, and his children go to school in Ennis. "I went to high school here, which makes it pretty cool to come back here and do all this. I was in the first freshman class that went all the way through in the new building." After graduating from EHS in 1985, Greg went to Texas



A&M and studied the management of building construction. After earning a construction science management degree, he worked in commercial construction as a supervisor, handling building management, scheduling and materials. "That makes this job easy for me, because I am dealing with people," he said.

Greg's familiarity with construction trades, including mechanical HVAC systems, plumbing systems, concrete, steel and bricks enables him to stay on top of all the aspects of building the new school buildings. "I meet with people daily in order to monitor the building progress and to solve problems every day. I monitor the relationship between the contractor and the architect. We are all on the same team and we want to accomplish the same goal, which is to give the school district the best building they can get with the money they have got. I let the architect and the contractor do their job, but I



pay attention and look for opportunities that come up to make improvements. I evaluate things and come up with the best solution," he explained.

Greg has overseen many updates to the pre-existing area of the high school building, which will house the ninth and 10th grades. "In the central hall, there used to be lockers, and there was



so much load on the trusses, that the floor bounced when the kids walked through," he said. "We have moved out most of the lockers and now the floor is not shaking because the load is spread out better. The traffic moves better, because kids don't hang out in this area now." The old gym floor is being stripped to the wood and refinished. The administration offices and classrooms have new flooring, paint, light fixtures and a sprinkler system. There are new air conditioner units for each classroom. Skylights have been made in the hallways. The HVAC system and the lights are on an energy management system and all of the classrooms have indirect lighting.

The entrance of the new 11th and 12th grade section of the high school is reached by the rebuilt, seven lane, upgraded Ensign Road. There is a new centrally-located cafeteria. A library for research is designed for computers, and has college-style study carols and conference rooms for small break-out groups. "There is a lecture hall that will seat about 200 people. It has a 3,000 pound rolling door so it can be closed off if the need arises for testing. The lecture hall can be used for


teacher training or combining three or four classes for special presentations with guest speakers. A large drop-down movie screen and marker boards are ready for use. The ceiling was designed by an acoustician," Greg said. The entire building has been hard-wired for Wi-Fi capability and all the classrooms have SMART Boards, which are touch-sensitive whiteboards combined with the power of a computer to display computer images as well as digital projectors. "SMART Boards are light-years ahead of what they used to have," Greg pointed out.

Greg is enthusiastic about the arts program amenities of the new senior high building. Art rooms have outside terraces for *plein-aire* painting. Kilns and sculpting areas are ready for the students and there is an art computer room. The auditorium is state-of-the-art with an orchestra pit, a green room, dressing rooms for men and women with showers and restrooms, a make-up room with lighted mirrors all around, costume and prop storage and a new black box theater. There is a scenes shop for prop and set construction with loading dock access. A glistening wood floor with a dance bar is in place in the dance/cheerleading room.

There is a new weight room and a gym for varsity and junior varsity basketball and volleyball. Behind the 11th and 12th grade school is event parking and a road which connects to the new junior high. The junior high will have its own library and gym, with the attention to quality that Greg insures. "We were able to do a geo-thermal system in the junior high. It is a really neat building, ultra-sharp," he expressed.

"Greg looks out for our interests," David Averett, high school principal, said. "I'm not a construction expert. I don't have that training; he does. He knows what standards are. With Greg, we have somebody watching our backs."

"Everyone in the Ennis school business does it for the kids," Greg added. "I know in the long-run, the kids are the ones that benefit."










# Living Each Day to the *Tullest*


The cottage-style abode, built in 1930, was moved to its present location in 1997. The couple was told that after that move, the home was completely gutted;




The living room is the first area







they began antiquing. In fact, even today it is an adventure for Tim. "Once he realized every item had a story, what he thought of as a wasted day soon became a history lesson," Amanda said. 

Singing is what makes Sue Neuhoff happy. "Music is what makes me get up and go," Sue said. "I have been singing since I was a kid." She


sang at the University of Texas with the Longhorn singers. For the last five years, she has been writing songs as well. "I write mostly country western and southern gospel songs. Even my gospel tends to sound kind of country western."

Sue does not like to sing to recorded tracks. "I understand why people do it, because if you are a singer, and don't play an instrument, you are dependent on a musician to accompany you. But I like people getting together and making music. I like live music. To me, the most fun thing in the whole world is to get a bunch of musicians around and I will stay up all night singing," she said.

Her love of creating live performance music led her to establish the Gospel Music Ministry in Ennis. "There is a beautiful gospel song called 'Loving God, Loving Each Other, Making Music With

My Friends.' That sums it up for me; that is what the Gospel Music Ministry is about," she expressed.

Sue was not hearing the type of music she preferred, so she decided to create a venue for it to be performed and enjoyed locally. "So many of the good, old-fashioned hymns that I love have gotten kind of booted out — like 'Softly and Tenderly Jesus is Calling.' If you do hear hymns in the church now, they are sung in a boring way. What I want is really upbeat new arrangements of old hymns, like 'Will the Circle Be Unbroken' and 'Till Fly Away' and 'Amazing Grace.' I



wasn't hearing that music and that is what I love. I can sing all those old songs until I have no voice," she said, adding, "I just think there are a lot of other people out there that feel that same way — especially people my age, and I want to get the younger group up there, too. If you do hymns with the right arrangement, where it is not stately sounding, young people like them."

"I am not that big on praise songs, although some of them I like," she said, explaining that the Gospel Music Ministry is for those who love the old-time hymns. "It is not traditional



ho-hum and it is not screaming guitars. We have electric guitars and drums, but I don't want it to sound like Mick Jagger is up there. I don't want it real

loud because I like to hear the words to the songs."

Two things happened that made the Gospel Music Ministry come about. "When I first got this idea, first I was praying about having more music in my life. That is just what I live for, really. God and family and music — that is it," Sue declared. The second epiphany happened at a church meeting. "My pastor, Keith Murray, said if everyone just did the ministry that gave us the energy to get going, instead of being on 10 committees, we would have a 'going' church," Sue recalled. "I thought, *God is trying to tell me something*. If



you are fired up for music, and you think you can do some good through music, and that is what makes you happy, that is what you are supposed to be doing."

Sue gives credit to her friends for helping her with organizing the ministry. Russell Bailey provided contact information for area gospel singers. Judy Hejny helped design a logo and Jimmy Boon and Bobby Montgomery hung the banner. The shows include a headliner group that plays a 30-minute set. Glory Bound was May's headliner.

## "God and family and music — that is it."

Vicky Gatling and Southern Rain, who play country music, southern rock and gospel, will headline at the August 24 show, to be held at First United Methodist Church.

The Gospel Music Ministry is something in which the whole family can participate. "My kids and grandkids are coming. Between my husband, Joe, and me, we have eight children and 16 grandchildren. There aren't that many things that you can do with your kids and your grandmother," she pointed out.

"The May show was so much fun. We had 150 people there, which I thought was good for the first show. It was a neat cross-section of ... people. It was very casual. It was wonderful! That is exactly what we are after," she said.

"I get my best feedback when people come up to me at the grocery store," Sue mentioned. "They say, "That was just what we wanted. That was so much fun. We never get to hear that kind of music. When is the next show?' So, that makes you want to keep going. I think it is fulfilling a need. It is a bunch of people having a real good time singing, and a bunch of people in the audience having a real good time listening."







At the Boys and Girls Club of Ennis, this year celebrating its 10th anniversary, basketball sign-up does not start until December, but the children are already congregating in the gym and practicing their game. "Basketball is the main sport we do during the school year," Sandra Poarch, director of finance and operations, said. Summer provides opportunities for bowling, swimming and field trips, but basketball is a year-round favorite. "Basketball is also part of the summer afternoon program," Sandra explained. "They rotate the different ages in to the gym to participate in three-on-three or basketball. They love basketball!"

During the summer, basketball games are sometimes organized by program director Dana Brim, but even when the kids have free time, they are on the court shooting baskets. "We are also set up for kickball and flag football and a made-up game called mat ball," Dana added. "The kids hit the ball, and then they have to make it to the base, but if they don't make it to the base, they [the opponents] tag them out." The players are divided into age groups for games, separating the 6- to 9-year-olds from the preteens and teens. "Every summer has been exciting," Dana said with enthusiasm.

"We are proud of Dana," Sandra said fondly. "We are a

team; together we can handle it all. We have to be ready for everything. On the first day of the summer program, at the Boys and Girls Club (BGC), we had 60 new kids, in addition to our regular ones. That means we have 60 kids that are not wandering around the streets. We were founded on a come-and-go situation, but they can stay here Monday through Friday nine to five, and the school does lunch for us." Swimming at the Optimist pool in Waxahachie is a regular weekly event. Many children sign up for educational field trips, such as the Fort Worth Zoo, or the Dinosaur Valley in Glen Rose. "They love it," Sandra said. "We go to the Texas Fishery in Athens. That is a good trip. We have about four field trips for the summer. The field trips are a way for them to experience things they might not experience otherwise. It is so exciting for them."

On a daily basis, participating kids move to the different activity areas in the BGC facility. "The games room is a favorite, but they love the gym, where they play games and basketball," Sandra said. "They will go outside and play kickball. Aerobics, or some kind of physical exercise, go on all year. We try to get them all moving."

Bowling, swimming and skating will go on all summer, until school starts. Then the focus begins to shift. "In August,



I make a whole new schedule because then we do the SMART Moves program," Dana said. SMART Moves is a program dealing with physical fitness and peer pressure, and it has several modules, including Smart Moves, Street Smart and Smart Girls. "Youth for Unity is another program we do that has athletics as well as teaching about different cultures," she said.

"They will go outside and play kickball. Aerobics, or some kind of physical exercise, go on all year. We try to get them all moving."

With basketball season on the horizon for ages 7 through 12, the BGC is signing up volunteer coaches. Volunteers are needed all year to work with the young people. Skills of all kinds are needed, from reading and cooking with the kids, to basketball coaches. Co-ed teams are formed and all are teaching teams, which do not require prior knowledge of the sport or any developed skills. Basketball is coordinated by the BGC Health and Fitness Director. The teams are set up in an internal league with brackets. At the end of the season, they hold a tournament.

"We are in the second year of a year-round program called Triple-Play, which focuses on mind, body and soul development," Sandra explained.



"Basketball comes under the body aspect of the program. At the end of the basketball season, we give participation medals and we have a banquet."

Everything at the BGC is done for a purpose. "While they are playing basketball or doing board games, table games and pool, it just looks like they are playing, but they are learning social skills," Sandra pointed out. "We play games that challenge them mathematically and challenge their logical-thinking skills, and they don't even know. It is hard work, because we teach while we play. I have a



noncompetitive game called Skillastics that I bought where they roll the dice and a mat shows the kids what they have to do — like five sit-ups for example." Another program, called Fitness Authority, involves Frisbees, bowling, tug-of-wars and races for different age groups.

Last year was the 100th anniversary of Boys and Girls Clubs of America. The Ennis BGC celebrated their local 10th anniversary with the annual Steak and Burger Fundraiser this summer. "We are a small club, so we are not staffed with a director for every area," Sandra mentioned. "All of us here wear many hats. It is interesting, but it is physically demanding. My favorite part of working here is that I know, when I leave work, that I have made a difference."

The new Ennis Regional Medical Center building turned a year old in July and ERMC is pleased with the developments they have made in the last year, since moving to their new facility. "Patient satisfaction, the single most important tool to measure a hospital's success, has improved," said Andre Gonzalez, director of business development.

"We just had a birthday party, and two things we are celebrating are the advances we have made in our women's services and in our imaging center," Andre pointed out. "There are a lot of things we have to be proud of from yesterday to today."

"There is no need to drive to Dallas for women's health care," Jaime Choate, director of the medical imaging center, said. "Compared with hospitals in Dallas, we have the exact same thing and, in some instances we have better equipment. Our MRI (Magnetic Resonance Imaging), CT (Computed tomography), nuclear medicine and both of our X-ray rooms are all brand new, installed last June. Our mammography machine is the latest and greatest technology and our lead mammography technologist, Kandace Stevens, has 20 years of experience."

Comfort and convenience are beckoning local women to make ERMC their healthcare destination. "When we installed all of our equipment, we tried to make it as user friendly as it could be," Jaime demonstrated. "Screening for osteoporosis, soft pad mammograms, and ultrasound are all inside the women's dressing area so women don't have to walk down the hall in a hospital gown. It is more private and comfortable." Making these facilities available to more working women was the goal when ERMC extended its hours to include 6:30 p.m. appointments.

ERMC recently purchased an ICAD system (computer aided detection). X-ray images are run through a computer system that acts as a second set of eyes for the radiologists. A state-of-the-art PAC system (picture archiving communication) allows X-ray, MRI and CT images to be computerized, rather than on film. "We have viewers all through the hospital, and a web-based viewing program that referring physicians view in their offices," Jaime said. "To be where we are right now, in my opinion, is awesome. I couldn't ask for any better equipment."


The cavalcade of new healthcare options for women continues in the Childbirth Center. In addition to appealing new rooms, where mothers can labor, deliver, recover and have rooming-in with their babies, there are childbirth classes, sibling classes, breast-feeding support groups and well-baby checks available. We offer basically the same care to mothers that the big hospitals do, but you can get more one-on-one care here," said Suzanne Tarkington, childbirth class instructor. "You have a more personal experience here. The people who work here are the people who live in your community and also come here for their own medical needs."

The breastfeeding class is not limited to mothers who




deliver at ERMC. "We are happy to help anyone," said Brenda Dennis, director of med/surg and the childbirth center. "They can come to the support group or come and get help from our lactation specialist, Ginger Daniels."

Dr. George Kingsley, ERMC's newest OB-GYN, offers women a new option called NovaSure for abnormal uterine bleeding. "This procedure takes under two minutes and is done as an outpatient procedure under light anesthetic. It is 92 percent effective and helps with pain, PMS and heavy



periods," Kingsley said. He also uses a new sling procedure, called TVT Secure, for urinary incontinence that requires no skin incisions.

It is a new day for ERMC. CEO Dave Anderson, who has been at the helm since November, has put a new team in place to meet the challenges. "We have the friendliest people and the nicest staff, who are so committed," Dave said. He has worked hard to improve the community satisfaction level with emergency room care. "I've been oriented toward process improvement in order to make the experience better for the patient," Dave said. "We don't consider ourselves a sleepy, little, small town hospital. We are going to be a fantastic hospital."

Kathy Cikanek is genuinely an early morning person. "My most productive time is between 7:00 and 8:00 a.m.," Kathy said. As the Ennis Independent School District's (EISD) assistant superintendent for curriculum and instruction, she works with a staff of three. "We are a great team. Brian Fry does our special programs and several other initiatives. Keith Larson oversees our textbooks, instructional materials and our state testing. Sherrie Stockton, my office manager, keeps us organized and makes sure we are at appointments on time."

Once the school day begins, phones are ringing and campus visits begin. "We are at all the board meetings, and I try to make a lot of the sports functions," Kathy said. Recruited by her mentor, Pat Cody, to join EISD's administrative arm in 1991, Kathy not only had academic credentials — a master's in elementary education from East Texas Commerce (which is now A&M Commerce), an administrative certification and a principal's certificate — she also had over 20 years of experience teaching in the district.

Kathy arrived in Ennis for a job interview as a fresh-faced 20-year-old. As an August graduate from Tarleton State University, located in Stephenville, Texas, she was especially anxious about securing a teaching post before the semester began. Her first day in Ennis turned out to be propitious. On the sidewalk in front of the administration building, she ran into Ennis principal Millard Owens, who had been her elementary school principal from McGregor. "I played in his front yard many times. His son and I were the same age, best friends," Kathy recalled. "He just took me right in and introduced me to the principal who had the position."

Newly hired at Austin Elementary, Kathy lost no time moving into the apartments across from San Jacinto auditorium. "At that time, teachers lived in all those apartments," she explained. Friendships and potluck dinners typified her early time as a single teacher. Kathy met an Ennis boy, Ronnie Cikanek, at a Willie Nelson/Waylon Jennings Black-Eyed Pea Festival in Athens, Texas, and after dating awhile, the couple planned a big Czech wedding. "It was kind of interesting, because my dad's family is also Czech, so I grew up around the Czech culture. On my dad's side of the family, when all the sons were home, it was not unusual to just speak Czech," Kathy said. "I had no idea Ennis was a Czech community. I quickly learned when I started seeing the rolls. We tell new teachers, 'You will learn to pronounce these Czech names.""

After the couple married, they were perfectly happy in



Ennis. "Austin Elementary was my home. Those people took me in when I was 20 years old. They saw me through the birth of my children and the death of my parents," Kathy shared. "Ronnie worked in Dallas for a while, but we still had this lovely community to raise our daughters, Linsey and Casey, in." Ronnie now does quality control for Leggett and Platt in Ennis and their daughters are both teachers in the district. "Ennis is a great place to be; Ennis is home. Maybe that is why I came and just stayed, because it actually did become my home," she added.

In her current role, Kathy oversees everything academic, including the counselors and nurses. "I make sure we have



#### **BEST EVER CHEESE DIP**

1 16-oz. pkg. Philadelphia cream cheese, softened

- 8 oz. sour cream
- 1 bunch green onions
- 1 1/2 cups sharp cheddar cheese
- 1 6-oz. can green chilies
- 1 small pkg. thinly sliced ham, torn into small pieces

Spread bacon over 4 layers of paper towels with 2 layers on top. Microwave on high until fat begins to melt, but bacon is still pliable (1 1/2 minutes). Meanwhile toss salt, pepper, cayenne and chives together; sprinkle over shrimp. Wrap each piece of bacon around shrimp, tucking the ends under the shrimp. Broil until shrimp are pink and edges of bacon are brown (about 3 1/2 minutes). Skewer shrimp with toothpick and sprinkle with chives.



The last few months have been difficult ones for investors. From October 2007 to the end of June, the Dow Jones Industrial Average fell about 20 percent. So, at this point, you probably have at least two big questions: What's causing this market instability? And how should you respond?

Let's start with the first question. What forces have caused the market drop? Here are some of the chief culprits:

• Gloomy economic news — Leading economic indicators suggest a significant slowdown in growth. For example, the unemployment rate hit 5.5 percent in May, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. That's an increase of over one full point in just over a year. Furthermore, oil prices recently hit another record high — over \$140 per barrel. Rising energy costs can significantly affect the economy — and usually not in a good way. • Subprime loan crisis — While the

subprime loan crisis has faded somewhat from the headlines, it's still having an impact on the

investment scene. First, the problems with subprime loans hit the real estate industry and the financial services industry. But now, the subprime crisis may have spread to the extent that consumers are being forced to pull back from spending.

• Decline in international stocks — As a huge part of

the global economy, the United States is far from immune to what's happening in foreign stock markets — and many of these markets are down between 20 and 30 percent over the past several months.

So, in a nutshell, these factors have helped lead to the stock market decline. Yet, as an investor, you may have opportunities right now, because many stocks have already fallen 25 or 30 percent. And the decline in stock prices has also meant a drop in the ratio of share prices to company earnings ("P/E"). In



fact, right now, the price-to-earnings ratio is pretty low, by recent historical standards.



# **Summer Physicals Keep Kids Fit for the Fall**

The summer is probably our nation's favorite time of year. For generations, children have been known to celebrate their freedom from the classroom with hearty barbeques, camping trips, swimming expeditions, as well as trips to the many amusement parks in the metro area.

It is important, though, for the kids — as well as for Mom and Dad — to squeeze in an appointment (between carnivals and street fairs) with their primary healthcare provider. While children usually stay pretty healthy, especially after receiving their recommended vaccinations, it is still a good idea to be seen once a year for a thorough physical examination. 


