





CURRENT MONTH TAX TIPS:

- **The residential energy efficient property tax credit has been increased to \$1,500 for qualifying energy efficient improvements.
- **For those of you who can claim child and dependent care credits, don't forget day camp costs can count as well.
- **Summer is for weddings, so for those recently married, don't forget to change your W4s at work, your filing status is determined by your married status at 12/31 of each year. So if you are married, your choices are married filing separately or married filing jointly. Be sure to notify Social Security Administration of your name change and IRS of your address changes.
- **Minimum wage went up again in July of 2009 to \$7.25 per hour, so be sure you are in compliance.
- **Extensions? Yes, they are due October 15th for individuals and September 15th for corporations. Hurry!

Learning to DICAM

Have you ever wondered what might be going on in the two-story home with the Dream Center sign across the street from the courthouse? Thelma Harvey, director of the Dream Center, describes her work there as a faith-based ministry. This nondenominational service is one of about 150 facilities affiliated with the Dream Center in Los Angeles. "This is not just a shelter; it's a program based on the belief that only God can change a heart," Thelma said. The program offers a structured daily routine to help individuals who want to leave a chaotic lifestyle behind and learn how to live a responsible, productive life.

Seven years ago, Thelma had a dream of her own. She had experience working in an organization, whose criteria for service were structured to include some people and exclude others. Thelma thought there should be a place that welcomed



anyone who needed to be there. Some would say Thelma's dream was, at best impractical, and at worst, impossible. However, she was persistent, and that made all the difference. The people who came to her were struggling with drug and alcohol addiction or mental illness. Others who came to the door were newly released from jail and a few were young adults released from



the Texas Youth Center with no home to return to. They all had two things in common. They were, for a variety of reasons, homeless and they had no dream of a better life. Thelma explained, "They had no experience of what it would be like to work a responsible job while making plans for the future. They have no image of themselves as a person with positive relationships with family, co-workers or the community."

The people who come to the Dream Center can learn how to have a dream for themselves. After a long time in a dysfunctional life, it takes time and guidance to find their dream. "We don't allow residents to take a job right away," Thelma said. "They need some time to work on themselves. Many need six months to a year to practice this new way of life. Unfortunately, not everyone is ready to stay long enough." It is important for a person, whose life has been chaotic, to experience a more structured way of living. The Dream Center program is organized into specific

times of the day when residents eat, sleep, pray, study and work.

The program is staffed by a couple, acting as house supervisors; a licensed counselor; and volunteers who teach classes. The daily routine determines wake-up time, breakfast, Bible study and class time. On Tuesday evenings, a minister from a local church leads a service in the house. On Sunday, residents



attend church service together. Two nights a week, Narcotics Anonymous and Alcoholics Anonymous meetings are held in the house and are open to the public.

"My favorite thing is to teach," Thelma explained. "I love these people. We have classes in anger management and money management. Most of what we do is based on Rick Warren's book, *The Purpose Driven Life.*"

The present Dream Center has enough room to house about 12 residents.

After Hurricane Katrina, the center

made space available to people who were transported from a group home in Louisiana. When Hurricane Ike came to Texas, the same generous people made room for the residents of a group home in Texas. "Our residents

gave up their beds and slept on sofas and on the floor to accommodate them," Thelma added.

Thelma's new dream came from this experience of offering housing that was beyond the capacity of the Dream Center. "We need more space for local people; perhaps an apartment building, so our residents can make a transition from this very structured lifestyle. They could be more independent and still be connected to the program and to people who would provide guidelines

and encouragement," she explained.
"The nursing home on Second Street
was donated to us, and it would have
been perfect for our needs. We were
working to fix it when vandals broke
in to steal copper and plumbing, and
in doing so, they destroyed the structure
so that the place was uninhabitable and
had to be torn down."

Loss of the larger facility was a disappointment. "Over time, I have had more disappointments than successes with the people I want to help," Thelma reflected. "Someone said to me, 'When I have a disappointment, it just happens to me. But you ask for it.' I had to learn not to let one person's failure get me down so that I'm no good for the next person. Besides, it's worth it to be helping so many people. After five years, a man came back here and said, 'You saved my life.' You can't make a

salary big enough to match that."

Prior to starting the Dream Center, Thelma had earned a master's degree in education and taught a fifth-grade class in Corsicana and then a ninth-grade class in Mildred. She taught in high school and she was on the adjunct faculty at Navarro College. She taught English, developmental writing and English as Second Language classes. "I returned to Corsicana when I married because my husband and his family live here," she said. "Then in the '80s, a family




situation changed my focus from teaching children to the problems of adults and, specifically, the lack of appropriate facilities to help adults with problems."

Thelma connected with the Dream Center program in Los Angeles. "At first it was exciting and fun to start the program," she admitted, "but the people working with me left after three months. I had to locate other people who could believe in what we are doing and have endurance. I don't know how to give up. It's just not part of me. I wanted to stay here in Corsicana. I like dealing with people I know when I go to the beauty shop, restaurant or bank. We manage to keep going with private donations, some trust funds and some of the churches help us. A few of the residents pay a portion of their SSI payments and others pay nothing. We don't want to turn anyone away because they cannot pay."

Thelma has a daughter and four grandchildren living in Tyler. "That is too far away," Thelma said. She would like to move closer to them, but she is not ready to end her commitment to the Dream Center. "God called me, and He hasn't told me it was over yet," she said.







Not being a native of Corsicana, Jimmy Hale has definitely made his mark on this community in more ways than one. "Growing up as a sharecropper's kid in northern Mississippi then moving to Memphis when I was around 8 or 9 years old, I am certainly no stranger to the small-town life," Jimmy stated. "I love the small-town lifestyle; it is slower and nicer than the big city."

Jimmy is the owner and operator of several Orkin Exterminator branches. "I remember the day I came home and told, Mary, that I would be killing bugs for a living,"



Jimmy said. "Admittedly, she wasn't too keen on the idea of her husband 'killing roaches for a living.' But after a while and the life we were leading together, she got used to the idea."

Because of his job, Jimmy and his family were privileged to live in several places around the United States, like New Orleans, Louisiana, and Sacramento, California. After about 20 years with



the company, their relocation to Corsicana was instigated by Mary. Having grown up in the Hillsboro area, she longed to move "back home." They moved into the Carriage District of Corsicana on Third Avenue.

In 2000, Jimmy and Mary purchased the home that they almost let slide through their fingers. "I remember, we lived next door," Jimmy said, pointing to the beautiful wood-framed house to the west of his home, "and our neighbor asked us if we wanted to buy this house. My wife, Mary, took me in the back room and insisted that she have the house," Jimmy said smiling. The







house soon became theirs.

Even though restoration and demolition is not Jimmy's fulltime job, it is definitely a passion and hobby for him. After 14 months of extreme renovation, which included new plumbing and new electricity throughout the home, new flooring and a new kitchen, the Hales were able to move into the residence. "I will never forget when Mary selected the color for the outside of


> the house. I thought I was in the Army or something," Jimmy said, pointing to the soft

hue of green, which accents the white trim and lead-paned glass windows." Even


> though the color may not be to Jimmy's personal preference, the house itself is the perfect wood-framed house that you might expect to find illustrating the pages of a novel set at the turn of the century.

Built in 1900, this 3,500square-foot house, complete with four bedrooms and a third-floor attic, has been completely restored to its original glory. Jimmy and Mary put their hearts and souls into it. "We completely gutted the kitchen; the

walls are still in their original places, but everything else has been replaced, except for

The craftsmanship of the house and the detail laid in every corner is quite obvious to visitors, and the detail and care, with which the restoration was done, make it surprising that home renovation is actually not Jimmy's full-time job. The beautiful wood floors in this old, classic house are a single plank in length. Each plank of wood extends the entire length of the room it is covering, with no seams in between. "The floors are completely

refinished. They had been covered with some trendy Formica flooring, but we came in and stripped them down, sanded them, and then had them refinished," Jimmy said.

Another huge undertaking was the remodeling of what is now known as "Jimmy's room." When the couple purchased the home, it was a sun porch with completely rotted-out floors. Today, located on the second floor, with three exterior walls banked in windows, the room is the perfect place to wake up to the sunlight or nap to the rhythmic sounds of a thunderstorm.

When Mary lost her battle with cancer in April of 2006, Jimmy kept her memory alive. There are still many items










found throughout the home that keep her in Jimmy's daily life. For example, the dining room set came from Mary's parents' house, and pictures of her will honor her memory for years to come.

"Since I started in March, I was able to be involved in







Forty-five years ago, a group of people gathered and started recording the memories, triumphs, charitable events and heart-warming activities that go on within the walls of what is now known as Navarro Regional Hospital. The work is done through the creative abilities and talents of the men and women of the hospital's auxiliary group.

"Our scrapbook has won first place several times," Susan Stites stated. "In fact, we won best overall scrapbook and tray favors in 2007."

"This year's competition took place on June 5 and 6 in San Antonio," Shirley Bowen stated. In addition to the scrapbook, the committee brings other

items to the competition to be judged in other categories. These include: tray favors, a newsletter and a poster, which doubles as marketing during the competition.

"We must take six tray favors to be judged at the competition;

they have specific requirements, such as height, size and other things," Susan explained. Basically, they must be able to fit under the lid used for food on hospital trays. "We typically make one for every holiday, to lighten the spirits of our patients; then we select our six best to take to competition."

There are various categories in which each hospital can win, and the judging is primarily done on the creativity and originality put into each project. "We are categorized by the number of beds our hospital has," Shirley explained.

"So, that means we aren't up against a hospital like

Baylor Medical; we are up against other hospitals our size. Everyone was really excited to be going. We are so proud of our team; we came home with second place on the scrapbook and the tray favors, and first place on the poster."

The project is very much a team effort. This year's scrapbook committee consists of six extremely talented and selfless individuals — Susan Stites, Cleita Ferrell, Martha Washburn (with some additional help from her husband), Sandra Curtis, Winona Stewart and Shirley Bowen. Each of these women has hidden strengths and talents, which they bring to the table when creating this wonderful work of art.



One of the main competition guidelines is that each auxiliary group must work on the project together, within the hospital walls. "That means that no one individual may take the book home with them and work on it in its entirety," Martha Washburn explained. "We must all work on it in our spare time up here at the hospital."

The pages are put together pretty much like any other scrapbook. The timeline of the events, photos and newspaper clippings are organized; then the theme of the scrapbook is followed throughout its entirety. In addition to her commitment to the scrapbooking committee, Martha Washburn was also the president of the auxiliary this past year. "One of the primary responsibilities of the president is to select the theme of that year's scrapbook," Susan explained. The theme Martha chose was "Have a Heart — Volunteer." All the pages, borders and construction paper are cut out and designed specifically to carry this theme throughout the book. The color scheme for this beautiful 96-page scrapbook includes white and a wonderful array of pink and red hues.



"We all really enjoy working on the projects together," Susan said. "We definitely enjoy the camaraderie." "But there are times when we each have different thoughts or direction, so every now and again we do have intense fellowships," stated Cleita Ferrell with a smile.











Even though the competition is fierce and the title is coveted, the dedication and hard work of the committee never looses sight of why they do what they do. They do it for the preservation and enjoyment of the hospital and all of their efforts are for the community.

The scrapbook itself is a definite thing of beauty. It is a culmination of thoughts, organization and hard work, bound into one beautiful keepsake and memory book, detailed down to every photo and clipping that is framed by a

Phil Castles is clearly enthusiastic about his job as the new head football coach at Corsicana High School (CHS). "Look out that window," he said, indicating the view from his office at the end zone of the football stadium. "Ten years ago, I was here as defensive coordinator under Tom Wilson. The old stadium was not anything like this. My wife, Suzanne, and the children are glad to be here, too. Suzanne is a physical therapist and a certified athletic trainer, so she'll be with me on the sidelines. I spent many summers with him here in Corsicana riding quarter horses in the big pasture behind his house," Phil remembered. "My father, David M. Castles, graduated from Corsicana High School. I grew up around coaches. My father was a tennis coach and he retired recently as athletic director at Kilgore College.

"I was one semester from finishing a master's degree at Midwestern State University, when James Cameron came to see me," Phil said. "He was my high school football coach, a Christian coach, who respected his students and emphasized loyalty to the team. He urged me to coach at his high school. I intended to continue as a college coach, but he talked me into looking at what he was doing, and I saw what it was like to have a real impact on helping boys grow into young men." It is one of the things he likes best about this job.

"My wife lives with the fact that I am away from home long hours. I love being there with her and my kids, but during the season I mostly see them when they are here with








there. The boys expected to work hard and they did." The team went to regional finals in 2004. "When I moved to Chapel Hill, I found many problems. It is part of the coaching job to figure out what's wrong and fix it, so we created a program that would help the boys take responsibility for their actions, admit mistakes, learn procedures and act on them without being told," Phil said. He learned a lot about teaching and coaching during his tenor at Chapel Hill. "We hit on the idea of doing a boot camp," Phil said. "We trained with adversity and unfairness, so they learned how to react to situations like that in life." There are three kinds of tests to master. Boot camp lasts as long as it takes for the top two of four groups to complete all three tests

without mistakes. Every day the boys are judged on their performance and attitude, and they are placed in the top, middle or the low fourth group. At the end of the camp, the players who end up in the fourth group will not play on the varsity team.

"Boot camp worked well, so we planned a leadership program that would continue during the year." The players earned points for doing things we set as leadership goals in boot camp. "In the beginning," Phil said, "some of the boys thought leadership was about what you wear, how you talk or how you walk around. We wrote down what we think




leadership is, and they saw those goals every day. One important thing we require is that each boy look me in the eyes and shake hands before they leave practice. They do push-ups if they forget. They come up to me in town now and shake my hand. When they have earned 40 points, they get a nice-looking leadership shirt to wear at practice, so the other boys can see they are becoming leaders."

Phil credits the leadership program and boot camp for the remarkable changes in the Chapel Hill team record. He led the team to three bi-district championships and to a record nine-win season in 2008. "We have already held boot camp here in Corsicana, and we expect great things from the leadership program starting this fall," he stated. "Building character is an important part of building a successful team."

CHICKEN AND RICE

2 cups Minute Rice

1 pkg. Lipton onion soup mix

6 to 8 chicken pieces salt and pepper, to taste

1 14-oz. can cream of mushroom soup

1 14-oz, can chicken gumbo soup

3 cups water

Spread rice evenly in bottom of greased 9 x 13-inch pan. Sprinkle with 1/4 of onion soup mix. Lightly salt and pepper chicken; and place on top of rice and soup mix. Sprinkle with remaining soup mix. Combine soup and water. Stir well and pour over chicken. Cover with foil; bake at 325 F for 40-60 minutes depending on how large the chicken pieces are

BROCCOLI CASSEROLE

1/4 cup onion, chopped

1/3 cup butter, melted

14-oz. (small) iar Cheez Whiz 8-oz. chopped jalapeños

10-oz. package frozen chopped broccoli

14-oz can cream of celery soup

2/3 cup Minute Rice

Sauté onion in butter; add Cheez Whiz and jalapeños. Stir until cheese melts. Stir in broccoli and soup; add Minute Rice. Pour into a greased casserole dish. Bake at 350 F for 45 minutes. Watch to make sure casserole does not get too brown.

BARRECHE CHICKEN

8 to 10 chicken pieces of your choice, enough to fill a cookie sheet

SAUCE:

1/4 cup margarine

1/4 cup ketchup 1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce

1/4 cup vinegar

1/4 cup lemon juice

1/2 tsp. pepper

Sprinkle chicken on both sides with salt. Place in foil lined shallow pan. Broil until golden brown on both sides. Combine sauce ingredients in saucepan. Cook over low heat until margarine has melted. Cover chicken with sauce and bake at 350 F until done.

BARBECUE MEAT LOAF

1 1/2 lbs. hamburger

1 cup fresh bread crumbs

1 eaa

1 1/2 tsp. salt

2 8-oz. cans tomato sauce

2 tsp. mustard

2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

3 Tbsp. vinegar

3 Tbsp. brown sugar

1/2 cup water

Mix hamburger, crumbs, egg, salt and 1/2 can tomato sauce to form meat loaf; place in greased loaf pan. Mix together rema ingredients in a separate bowl. Pour over meat loaf: bake at 350 F for about one hour. Baste meat loaf with sauce several times as it bakes.

SALMON PATTIES

1 16-oz. can salmon, drained

1/2 cup onion, chopped

1/4 cup margarine, melted

1/3 cup dry bread crumbs 2 eggs, beaten

1/2 cup parsley, chopped

1 tsp. powdered mustard

corn meal (enough to roll patties in)

Mix all ingredients, except corn meal, together; form into patties, Roll patties in corn meal; fry until done.

SPAGHETTI CASSEROLE

1 pkg. spaghetti

1 onion, chopped

1 green pepper, chopped

1 lb. hamburger

1 tsp. garlic powder

1 bay leaf

1-2 tsp. thyme 1 tsp. salt

1 tsp. peppe

2 small (8-oz.) cans tomato sauce

Cook spaghetti in salted water. Sauté onion, green pepper and hamburger. Add garlic, bay leaf, thyme, salt, pepper and tomato sauce. Put spaghetti noodles in bottom of casserole dish, place meat mixture on top; top with thin slices of Velveeta cheese. Bake at 350 F for 20 minutes covered; bake 10 additional minutes uncovered.

Wound Care Giving your body's healing powers a helping hand

Have you ever watched a scar heal and marveled at the power your body has to repair itself? Or worried over a cut or sore that simply won't go away? The body's ability to heal after illness or injury is a complex process. Many chronic diseases or conditions can compromise your body's restorative capabilities. Unhealed wounds can not only diminish quality of life, but also raise the risk of additional infection and complications. For this reason, wound care is a critical part of disease management or surgical recovery — and a growing medical specialty.

Approximately five million Americans suffer from chronic wounds that will not heal or heal slowly, from accidents, burns, surgery or disease. Chronic wounds are most

often found among the senior population; patients who are bed-ridden; and individuals who suffer from diseases that affect the circulation and skin, such as diabetes or peripheral artery disease (PAD).

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, diabetes affects 23.6 million Americans or 7.8 percent of the population, and one-third of all diabetics suffer from lower extremity wounds or PAD. These wounds increase the likelihood of foot problems and the potential for amputation. Other conditions that can lead to slow-healing wounds include traumatic injury, complications after surgery, congestive heart failure, lymph edema, and compromised immune systems, including HIV or AIDS infection.

Many hospitals have a wound care team, center or clinic, with specialists trained in advanced therapies that help to speed the healing process and promote or rebuild skin integrity. Chronic wounds that are treated in this way include diabetic skin sores, pressure sores, persistent skin irritations, vessel disease wounds, surgery wound breakdown, traumatic wounds, burns, venous insufficiency, radiation injuries, spinal injury wounds and other non-healing wounds. Many of these wounds become problematic due to limited blood flow in the area, which can slow the body's healing process.

Wound care treatments include transcutaneous oxygen measurement, dressing changes, hyperbaric oxygen therapy and wound debridement (removal of dead tissue). These treatments differ from the standard care a patient would receive after surgery or in the course of chronic disease treatment, because they involve specialized therapies administered in conjunction with other medical or surgical treatment for the skin condition. It may include special dressings or wraps, debridement (the removal of dead or damaged tissue), bioengineered tissue substitutes or hyperbaric oxygen therapy to invigorate oxygen-starved tissues and promote healing.


A patient's doctor generally refers a patient to a wound care team or treatment center where specialists evaluate the wound and review the patient's health and medical history. Tests may be conducted to learn more about the patient's blood flow and tissue oxygenation, as well as determine if there is any infection. The team then develops a treatment program based on the patient's individual needs and is part of the patient's comprehensive medical treatment with the primary care doctor.

Once the wound is healed, follow-up care is important and should be in conjunction with any care the patient may be receiving for the condition that originally caused the wound, such as diabetes or hypertension.
