

Head of the second seco

Local actress, Fran Jeffery Anderson, has turned her dreams of a community that cherishes its heritage into dramatic reality. Based on her belief that the performing arts can educate, as well as entertain, the unique theatrical troupe she has founded is enjoying wide acclaim. Targeting a black audience with black themes, Inspiration, Inc. has become inspiration central for the Ennis-based entertainer whose passion for music and drama defines her life. "We as African-American people have such a rich history to celebrate," Fran said. "The goal of Inspiration, Inc. is to educate our community about that history through the arts, especially theater."

The high-spirited director is quick to admit her incentive for forming the group is as personal as it is altruistic. "It stems from my upbringing," she said. "I was an Army brat and lived in France when I was little. I didn't know my own heritage and discovering it was a big deal. That's why I do black theater. It comes from the heart."

Born in Louisiana, Fran was an infant when her parents moved to a military base near Paris. Five years later the family returned to the States, taking up residence in Fort Worth, where Fran was reared. "It was a culture shock," she said. "I wanted to know who I was, and in my teens I even went a little wild, wearing an Afro and a pick. I was trying to find my blackness."

Fran's search led her to Ennis in 1998 as a regional organizer for the Boys & Girls Club, the local affiliate for which she eventually served as executive director. "I loved travelling and meeting people," she said of her job as roving trainer for the club's facilities in Fort Worth, Arlington and Amarillo. "But I prayed for a set position so my children's education wouldn't be interrupted." Fran also wished for an outlet for her first love — performing. She found both in Ennis, the Bluebonnet City.

Of her tenure with the Boys & Girls Club of Ennis she said she "loved every minute of it," adding that her projects



for local youth were "well-received" from every quarter – from the Ennis Independent School District to the Lions Club. Fran made her mark creatively, too, by bringing artistic programming to the Boys & Girls Club, and to the public at large, as a member of the Ennis Arts Commission, to which she was appointed president in 2001. Meanwhile, she was becoming known citywide for her gospel singing and motivational speaking.

Although she left the Boys & Girls Club for Texas Discovery Gardens, Fran remained active in church circles and the artistic set surrounding the Ennis Public Theatre, where she appeared in two successful plays, *Little Shop of Horrors* in 2007 and *Proposals* the following year. "I love the Ennis Public Theatre," she said. "Bill and Suzanne Rhoten and the whole gang there are great."

Inspired by Bill, who became a mentor for the actress, Fran said she decided to branch out on her own to establish a family-friendly, Christian theater group focusing on the black community. She said she had long noted "a need among African-Americans for the arts." Yet material was seldom geared to the black experience, and she wanted to fill the gap. "I realized there was a lot of talent here in Ennis that wasn't being used," Fran explained, "and I thought that with the right vehicles, blacks and other minorities, who haven't been involved in local theater, could take part."

By forming Inspiration, Inc. in 2009, Fran has accomplished her goal of providing positive, faith-based entertainment aimed primarily toward African-Americans. Over the last two seasons the group has sponsored youth acting workshops, a summer theater camp and open mike nights at venues ranging from the Ennis Public Library to the First United Methodist Church. Students learn monologue delivery, hear guest lectures by professional actors and put their training to the test by appearing in select vehicles approved by a board of directors. One

Waxahachie and Arlington. "I loved *Crowns*," said one fan, Doris Collins of Ferris. "It was heartwarming."

Crowns, written by Dallas playwright, Regina Taylor, tells the story of a New York City teen, embraced by her Southern grandmother and her hatwearing church friends. The musical, which features traditional gospel tunes like "His Eye is on the Sparrow" and colorful African costumes, was a bigger



hit than Fran expected. "Crowns wasn't scheduled for this season," she said. "But we have had so many requests for it that we brought it back." The play was last presented on the campus of The University of Texas at Arlington where Fran is studying theater administration.

Fran is proud of the success Inspiration, Inc. has enjoyed and has high hopes for future seasons. She credits her actors, musicians and advisers – Sandra Struggs, Markus Sallie, Kellie Kovar and Sue Powell — for contributing to its growth. But board member, Sandra Wakefield, acknowledges Fran as the real force behind the scenes. "Fran is so affirming," she said. "She is a great encourager. She wants everyone to shine."

Fran isn't one to rest on her considerable laurels. "There's still work to do to get us where we need to be," she confessed. "We don't have a regular venue, so that's a challenge. Right now we put on our shows anywhere we can find a spot."



and some of the "church lady" hats worn by her cast in *Crowns*. Fran's son, Joe, whom she singles out as the "techie" who helps her with sound systems and computers, is attending classes at Navarro College.

Forthcoming Inspiration, Inc. productions include *The Gospel at Colonus*. "It's set in a black Pentecostal church," Fran enthused, "and the music is awesome." *A Raisin in the Sun*, the Lorraine Hansberry classic, is in the planning phase, too, qualifying that it won't matter how fine the vehicle is without community interest and aid.

"Our goal is to encourage more black people to support and participate in the arts," Fran said. "You can join Inspiration, Inc. by performing, donating money or time and helping out with costumes or props. There is a place for you in theater. It's right here in Ennis!"

Life takes many twists and turns, some planned, and many others unexpected. Sometimes, it weaves itself into a long marriage that includes four beautiful children. As time goes on, loved ones pass away and the children mature, marry and move into their own homes. Thirty years after living on Knox Street rearing her family, Billie Davis looked around and realized the turn her life was taking meant downsizing. 'Ken, my husband of 29 years, had passed away. My four kids, Kim, Kerry, Kenny and Kevin, were grown and gone, having children of their own. It was just me and mom," Billie said, referring to her soon-to-be-98-yearold mother, Angie Winn.

With her "painter's eye" and an idea in mind, Billie got started on the design of her new three-bedroom, two-bath home on the outskirts of town. "It took a couple of months to complete the design," she said. "Once the plans were finalized, I sent them to a local architect who at the time was working with Eric Toth, my son-in-law and the contractor on the new home." Listening to her retell the story, it's easy to see the fulfillment it brought her.







"It was the most fun project I've ever done, and I'd do it again in a heartbeat, but my kids would probably kill me," she admitted with a smile. "They were all involved in one way or another. The boys





When Billie told Eric she really wanted a koi pond in the home, she thought he would most certainly tell her, "No," and that would be the end of it. He surprised her by saying he'd have a putting green in the middle of his home if he was still single. Eric didn't really know the first thing about installing a pond, in or outside the home, so Billie's youngest son, Kevin, decided to take on the responsibility of "pond project manager."

The surprise is not that the home has a built-in koi pond. It's the location and size of the pond that are unique to the overall design. The 1,000-gallon pond, located in the very center of the home, takes up the entire back wall, and juts out in all directions. The natural beauty can be enjoyed from all rooms, and the relaxing sound of the waterfall and the koi jumping is soothing to the soul.

The original plans called for the depth of the pond to be right at six feet. Once all the necessary precautions were taken to ensure the pond would not leak into the home, the pond ended up being closer to three-and-a-half feet deep. "It could be deeper and much, much bigger," Billie said, as she stood on the rock landing looking down at what was once only a schematic drawing on paper. "I've always had an aquarium, and I've always loved fish."

Billie purchases the koi when they are very small, but in two to three years, she finds they have gotten too big for the pond. "I feed them twice a day, once in the morning and again in the evening. I supplement their koi food diet with frozen green peas," she explained. "Watching them eat, well that's the fun in having them." Once they outgrow their space, Billie puts them on Craig's List and sells them for a very small profit, so she can start the koi process all over again. Right now, the koi are seen in all sizes and shades of yellow, red, orange,







black and white. Swimming and jumping alongside them are 12 types of tropical fish, including angel fish that fight solely amongst themselves. While sitting alongside the pond, you also see mollies, guppies, Gourami, electric yellow cichlid, an African butterfly, several different fantail goldfish, shubunkin and a pair of "perfectly safe" Bala shark.

Growing up just outside Del Rio, Texas, Billie remembers the adventures she had on the Devil's River. "I was



She readily admits it's taken the six years she's been in her new home to complete the landscaping in the front, while the backyard is still very much a work in progress. As visitors look around at what was once only a blank canvas, they quickly realize Billie is living within the portrait she's created.

Riding a bull might not be on every church's list of weekly activities, but that is exactly what youth ages 9 to 18 anticipate doing on Tuesday nights at the Cowboy Church of Ennis' lighted rodeo arena located next to the church on Interstate 45. As Heath Gulledge, a bull rider for 14 years and cofounder and bull riding instructor for Spurrin' for Christ, stated, "This is the only place in Ennis you can go to church and get dirty."



Getting dirty has to be one of the attractions of the Tuesday night events because 35 to 100 kids show up every time they see the arena lights glowing brightly since the Spurrin' for Christ bull riding began eight months ago. Word of mouth, encouragement from friends and a listing on the church's Web site are the only advertisements. Yet the old saying, "Build it and they will come," has been true. Anxious-to-ride participants have come from as far away as Garland, Texas. "Some young people just come to watch friends or family, and some arrive late into the competition due to their commitments to other activities, which include feeding animals for county show competitions," Heath explained. However, whether they ride or watch and cheer for others, all attendees have a good time, hear the Word of God and receive encouragement from interested adult leadership.

"Blake Blevins and I came up with the idea from one of the youth. We got together with the church and just did it," Heath stated. A group of adults comprised of Heath and his wife, Michelle, Shannon and Jim Seymour, and Rodney and Sharon Pechal were joined by another former rodeo cowboy, Blake, and his wife, Lisa, when they joined the church. Lisa recalled that the primary reason why she and Blake moved from Granbury to the Ennis area was because of this church. "This is just a sweet, sweet church family," she stated.

Many of the adults have a rodeo background. "There are grown men out here having fun reliving their childhoods,"



Heath stated. Plenty of parents, siblings and friends of the bull riding participants line the stands and volunteer in other ways. No rodeo would be complete without the rodeo clown, and this event has two clowns, one of whom drives from Midlothian and doubles as an emergency medical technician (EMT) just in case the need should arise. Other adults volunteer to run the concession stand since food and drinks are needed to fuel youthful appetites with good downhome cooking. Other adults are just there to lend an ear and give a kid someone



they can talk to. "We've all walked a wide variety of lives," Heath said. "We are just trying to prevent these youth from going down some of the paths we've gone down."

Bull riding is a youthful sport since it



is considered to be the most dangerous of rodeo events. A rope is wrapped around the bull with a weighted cowbell hanging underneath. The rope is held tightly around the bull's girth by the rider. A rider will be disqualified for touching the bull with his or her free hand or being bucked off before the eight-second buzzer sounds. A rider is not required to spur the bull, but if the rider does so, the marks will be higher. Protective gear is worn by all participants.

Kids are taught to ride the rough stock by first practicing on a bucking barrel while receiving instruction. The bulls are as mild as bulls can be. Some participants are astride a bull after only a few lessons. Heath and Blake are good at matching bulls to kids. Girls are welcome to ride, too. Shannon's daughter told her dad that she had a "bucket list" of things she wanted to do, and she has since accomplished bull riding. "You can see the smiles and how happy they are. The kids realize what they have accomplished," Heath revealed. The youngest kids are cautious at first about getting on the smaller bulls, and some of the older kids think the bulls are too little for them, but everyone has a bull just waiting to give them an exciting experience.

During the intermission a volunteer speaks and offers his or her testimony. "We try to encourage new kids to get up and say what's on their minds," Heath said. The adult volunteers patiently share their own stories and talk with the youth as though they are young adults. "We don't hold them up to be [like] us. We just give them someone they know and can


Mr. "P" said, "The therapy department was unbelievable! They were so patient with me through this long process."



come and talk with and not be criticized," Heath stated. "We're trying to help the kids keep Him first."

Funds are raised through the \$10 entry fee and by selling food and drinks at the concession stand. Farmers can come right in dressed for the fields or a three-piece suit can be worn. "Once you walk through those doors it doesn't matter what your past was, you are welcomed," Heath stated.

"This church is amazing because it is so family-oriented," Lisa added.

Shannon summed it up for the group, "We preach, pray and play." Those ingredients for success seem to be working, since children are encouraging the parents to come to church. **NOW**



Tickled Skinny

Cosmetic procedures that are changing lives for the better. — By Sandra Strong

Patients wanted what was being offered in the Metroplex, so Dr. Larry Jinks, along with staff members, Kristi Leal, Stacey Bobalek and Christina Marlow, gave them what they were looking for in Ellis County Medical Associates Med Spa. "We responded to the requests of our patients," Dr. Jinks stated. "Patients wanted cosmetic skin care services. All we did was listen."

As the patient list continued to grow, Dr. Jinks made the decision earlier this year to open an office strictly for the honest med spa approach he was offering. 

Stepping in the Right Direction to Manage Joint Pain

Each year, there are 61 cases of menisci injuries per 100,000 people. Given that Ellis County has a population of approximately 150,000 residents, roughly 100 people will suffer from this injury yearly. Injury of the menisci, a fibrous cartilage of the joint, especially of the knee, is a very common orthopedic injury, which can cause marked physical impairment. The symptoms can include soreness, mechanical block to motion and severe pain. The majority of these symptoms are located at the joint line; however, pain can be referred to the back of the knee or down the lower leg. These injuries account for 50 percent of surgical injuries to the knee.

The basic anatomy of the meniscus consists of semi-lunar shaped fibro-cartilaginous wedges. They function to provide a cushion similar to shock absorbers for a car. The meniscus accepts 50 percent of the load on the joint transmitted in extension and 85 percent of the load transmitted in flexion. They also provide some secondary stabilization for the knee in much the same way a chuck block prevents a wheel from rolling. The meniscus also functions to provide some joint lubrication. The blood supply to the meniscus penetrates roughly the outer one-third of the rim. Unfortunately, this means many menisci tears will not heal.

Traumatic tears of the meniscus occur from sheer forces or a twisting and sliding motion. Commonly associated injuries include Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL) tears or chondral contusions (bone bruises). Degenerative tears can occur as arthritis progresses. These occur in individuals over 40 and are directly correlated to the degree of reticular cartilage degeneration. Unfortunately, these have little or no healing potential. Longitudinal tears are the most frequent traumatic tears. A medial meniscus tear is three times more likely in this type, becoming symptomatic when the size of the tear is greater than 5 mm. Radial tears are usually traumatic as well. Function is compromised when the tear extends to the periphery. Horizontal tears are more common in older patients. Continuing to walk on this can lead to tear propagation and displacement of the torn fragment.


Weight-bearing X-rays are an important first step in evaluating any knee injury to rule out fracture and to assess the degree of degenerative change. An MRI is the diagnostic study of choice and should function also as a confirmatory tool.

Two methods in managing this type of pain are available. Nonsurgical treatment is appropriate for small, stable peripheral tears when no mechanical symptoms are present. Physical therapy, anti-inflammatory medication and modifying activities can provide many patients with significant improvement of symptoms. Surgical treatment is reserved for patients with significant mechanical symptoms or for those that have not responded well to nonsurgical treatment. Some tears of the peripheral meniscus can be repaired in younger patients. Even partial meniscectomy can lead to increased progression of arthritic change. The goal is to help restore function while preserving as much meniscus as possible.

In The Kitchen With Dr. George Kingsley

"We would watch cooking shows for new ideas, then we'd travel into Cleveland or Pittsburgh for specialty ingredients. On Sunday afternoons, our kitchens, grills, smokers and ovens would be in action to prepare that week's menu."

Since that time, Dr. Kingsley has enjoyed trying new foods as he has traveled throughout the world. "I try to recreate them when I get home," he said. "I love lots of spice and not just a little heat. All my recipes are from scratch and all are subject to BYOC – be your own chef – rules." NOW

Onion Dip

Serve with celery, carrot sticks or your favorite chip.

2 Tbsp. olive oil
3 medium Vidalia or Texas Sweet
Onions

tsp. salt
large cloves garlic
tsp. white pepper

4-6 oz. low-fat mayonnaise
4-6 oz. sour cream

I. Heat oil in a large sauté pan. Dice the onions to a medium-coarse size; add to hot oil.

2. Reduce heat to medium and sauté the onions, continually stirring with a wooden spoon or spatula.

3. Sprinkle salt over onions and continue stirring until the onions are caramelized and a dark brown color.

4. Peel garlic and crush into pan. Stir until the garlic is fragrant. Mix in white pepper

and spoon ingredients into a mixing bowl to cool.

5. Blend in mayonnaise and sour cream. Transfer to a serving dish and refrigerate for 1 hour.

Slow-cooked Beans

Serve with barbecue, chicken or steak.

I Tbsp. cumin
I Tbsp. Kosher salt
I tsp. Cayenne pepper
8-16 oz. low-sodium beef stock
1/2 cup dark brown sugar
I lb. Great Northern Beans (dry) rinsed, sorted and soaked overnight
I-2 jalapeños and/or I-2 Serrano chiles, finely diced (optional)

I. Brown the bacon in large Dutch oven. Remove and drain on paper towels. Add onions and stir until they start to brown and caramelize.

2. Peel and crush garlic; stir in. Blend in

tomato paste, molasses, cumin, salt and pepper.

 Add beef stock; stir until smooth. Stir in brown sugar. Add beans with soaking liquid. Make sure beans are fully covered with liquid.
 Add additional beef stock if needed. Add peppers and/or chiles if desired. Cook overnight at 250F (6-8 hours minimum).

Coconut Curried Shrimp

- 2 cups jasmine rice
- 2 tsp. vegetable oil
- I cup white onion, minced
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 tsp. cumin
- 1 tsp. coriander
- 1-2 tsp. hot curry powder
- 2 tsp. sugar
- 1/2 tsp. red pepper flakes
- I-2 cups coconut milk

I-2 lbs. fresh jumbo shrimp, peeled and deveined

2 Tbsp. fresh cilantro, chopped 1/2 cup raisons

 Cook rice in rice maker or on stove.
 Heat oil in large sauce pan. Sauté onion until softened. Add garlic and dry spices; mix well.

3. Add one cup of coconut milk; bring to a boil. Reduce heat to medium.

4. Add shrimp; cook until shrimp are pink and curled. Add additional coconut milk as needed to create a thin sauce.

5. Serve over hot rice. Garnish with cilantro and sprinkle with raisons.

Cajun Chicken and Sausage

- $1 \frac{1}{2} 2$ lbs. boneless skinless
- chicken thighs
- 3 Tbsp. vegetable oil
- 3-4 Tbsp. Emeril's Essence or
- Cajun seasoning
- I lb. link sausage
- 2 cups long grain white rice
- 3-4 green onions
- Frank's Red Hot Sauce

I. Rinse and dry chicken. Coat with oil and Cajun seasoning. Cover and marinade in refrigerator for 1 hour.

Grill sausage and chicken until thoroughly cooked. Remove from grill and allow to rest.
 Slice sausage and chicken into 1/2-inch slices and serve over rice. Garnish with green onions. Serve and sprinkle with hot sauce to desired heat.
