Give Linda Zumwalt a classroom, a handful of eager second-grade students and a computer and watch her passion overflow. Linda feels comfortable being silly with her students, reading to them and watching their faces light up as they learn something new. 'I like working with the kids. It's just fun to see them catch on to a new concept or skill," Linda smiled.

For 35 years, Linda has been teaching, and her passion shows. In 2012, she was awarded the MISD Elementary School Teacher of the Year award. She was so shocked she had won the award that she started out her acceptance speech saying, "Well, if you all were second graders, this would be much easier."

Ever since Linda was 5 years old, she knew she wanted to be a teacher. "I just liked school. Even as a kindergartener, my teachers would ask me, 'What do you want to be?'

"I would always say, 'I want to be a teacher,"' Linda shared. Although neither of her parents were teachers, she credits them for her long commitment to teaching. "They were immigrants from Switzerland and just always instilled in us a hard work ethic," she explained. "It was just expected that we would do well."

Linda met her husband of 43 years in Bremerton, Washington, her home state. "He was stationed in the Navy,



and his carrier came into Washington for repairs, so that's how we met," Linda described. He was shipped away for a year after the couple had met, and when he returned, they got married. Together, they have three children and seven grandchildren, as well



as a home on an acre in Rendon. The couple has lived there ever since they moved to Texas over 30 years ago.

Linda's teaching career began in Seattle, where she taught for several years. After staying home for a few years as her children grew up, she couldn't resist going back to teach. She decided the easiest way was to be a substitute teacher and slowly ease her way back into the classroom. After a conversation with her children's principal, Linda was quickly put to work. "I told the principal I want to start teaching, and I should sub to ease my way back in," Linda smiled. "She said, 'Okay. I need a kindergarten teacher tomorrow.""

Soon after, Linda started substituting long-term at Alice Ponder Elementary School. When a second-grade teacher on leave decided not to come back, Linda took the job and stayed for 18 years. When Mary Jo Sheppard Elementary School was opening eight years ago,





Linda started teaching at the new school and has been there ever since.

Creating an atmosphere of fun and learning is important to Linda. In the corner of her classroom sits a wooden rocking chair from which she reads to her students. Reading is one of her favorite subjects. "I like to read out loud to them," Linda smiled. "Right now, I'm reading *James and the Giant* Peach out loud to them. It's a great story." Even the children love sitting in the rocking chair. "When they have independent reading, where they read to themselves, you'll see two of them squeezed in there. They just like to sit there," Linda laughed.

On some days, the second-grade students in Linda's class don't even sit in their seats. "Sometimes, they can sit on the floor to do some work, and we do small group activities also, so that it's not just me up front teaching the whole time," Linda explained. Students also get awards for good behavior, such as bringing a stuffed animal to school,

stinky feet day (where students can take off their shoes in class, provided they are wearing socks), show-and-tell on Friday or lunch with Linda.

Even though Linda has been teaching for many years, she loves trying new ideas. She changes nearly every project and activity in her classroom each year. "I'm always ready to jump in and try something new," she remarked.

This tenacious aptitude for learning led her to apply for a grant with the district for a document camera. The camera allows her to put a book or her student's work under the camera, which will then project it onto the whiteboard. At the time, not every classroom had this piece of equipment, and Linda believed it could be helpful for her students.

In order to apply for the grant, Linda connected the use of the camera to a project with her students. The second graders would dissect sanitized owl pellets for bones and re-create the skeletons of what the owl ate. Students could view the skeletons with the document camera. Shortly after Linda applied for the grant, the district awarded her a document camera, and Linda continues to do this project year after year.

Linda's fellow second-grade teachers are often amazed at Linda's ongoing desire to try something new. Susan

Sheridan, a second-grade teacher at Mary Jo Sheppard, explained, "She makes learning fun because she's so interested in learning."

Louellen Brown, also a second-grade teacher at Sheppard, echoed Susan. "When the school got all this technology in the classrooms, she was one of the first people who really went out and dove into it," she said. "She always goes the extra mile for her kids."

Many of Linda's students, some of whom are already grown with children of their own, benefitted greatly from her use of technology in the classroom. "Linda taught both of my daughters," said Olga Felan, another second-grade teacher at Sheppard. "They enjoyed being in her class, and the technology was a big thing that really impacted them."

Kellie McCase described her 16 years as a second-grade teacher and working with Linda as encouraging and informative. "She's introduced me to a lot and taught me a lot about technology that I have brought into my classroom," Kellie explained.

Because of this, Linda acquired a reputation for being innovative. "I know there are a couple of people who say, "Well, let's wait until Linda does it and we'll see how it works," she laughed.

Linda's philosophy on teaching is that every student has potential. "All of these kids can learn. You have to find their style of learning, because they don't all learn the same way," Linda explained. As such, this second-grade teacher incorporates music, poems or any other creative way to teach her students. "Every one of them has the potential to learn," Linda explained. "I just have to take them from where they are and work with them to help them realize their potential."

Venture into the First United Methodist church in Mansfield on any Tuesday or Thursday night and you might find any number of events happening. One of them would be a small group of adult students pouring over homework, listening to their instructor and chomping down on a free meal. You would find the instructor reading a story from the Bible about a man or woman who had a rough time in life, but still made it through with their heads held high. You would find a business leader answering questions as a part of a panel or an unemployed woman practicing for her upcoming job interview. In short, you would find the


Jobs for Life program.

The program began in the fall of 2012 when Leadership Mansfield, an organization of the Chamber of Commerce, approached both Teresa Washington, program director at the Wesley Mission Center, and the executive director of the Wesley Mission Center, Teresa Sherwood. They asked what the biggest needs of the community were and how they could

"What does our community need? Jobs, jobs, jobs!" Teresa Washington explained. The unemployed were having a difficult time paying bills and feeding their children. But the Wesley Mission Center didn't want to simply write a check for those who needed to pay rent and move on. They wanted to teach skills and a work ethic for life-long success.

So the pair set out to find a program to do just that. Since Jobs for Life is a national program, they were able to visit other sites that had already implemented the program. They were pleased with what they found and quickly rallied a panel of business leaders with Leadership Mansfield and an army of volunteers for food, childcare, and to be mentors. Their mission statement is empowering people on the journey to self-sufficiency and wholeness. The program helps people who are either unemployed or are looking for a better job with twice a week meetings, homework and mentors, who are called champions.

One of the participants who has benefitted greatly from the program is Lisa Chasteen, a single mother of five children. "If I had to choose between winning the lottery and taking this class, I would choose this experience," Lisa smiled. For her, the greatest aspect of the program is the support group. "It pushes us to grow," she described. Lisa hopes to eventually find a job working in real estate.





students being very shy at first. "At the first meeting, she was very timid and quiet. She was afraid to look me in the eye," Debbie remembered. "But by the end, we were like long-lost cousins! She walked taller. There was a transformation, and it was thrilling." Debbie further explained how the Jobs for Life program gave her student a breath of fresh air that changed her life. Now, Debbie is a part of the meal team that provides free meals for the students every week.

Paulette Tutor, the coordinator for Jobs for Life, has enjoyed seeing students gain confidence throughout the program. "We want to hone in on their God-given talent, so that they aren't just making a living, but enjoying what they do, too," she explained. Much of her job is screening and coordinating the volunteers and making relationships with community business leaders. Often, these leaders come to the meetings to give advice, and sometimes, one thing will lead to another, and they may even hire students. "Often, it's just about who you know," Paulette said. "So we encourage the students to find jobs by networking."

But, Teresa Washington and her staff understand the program wouldn't happen without the work of dedicated volunteers. "This is an opportunity for people to give back and use their gifts by being a mentor, serving food or just helping outside the box." Teams with the Jobs for Life program include the champion team, meal team, course instructors, student relations (those who make sure students maintain appropriate boundaries



AT HOME WITH Chad and Alison Farsons

"¡Bienvendios! Mi casa es su casa" reads a sign that hangs in Chad and Allison Parsons' kitchen. It's one of the first things visitors see, and they immediately know they are in the company of friends. Translated, the sign means "Welcome! My house is your house," and it's exactly this welcoming attitude the Parsons weave throughout their home.






In addition to their two daughters, the Parsons family also includes three furry friends. "Our dogs are a big part of



Russian music. "I can tell you the basics in 18th century music composition," James admitted.





Will You Be Able to Retire When You Want?

Despite the soaring stock market of the past few years, some Americans are nervous about their ability to retire comfortably — or even retire at all. Consider these somewhat sobering statistics:

•Almost half of American workers report being "not too confident" or "not at all confident" about being able to afford a comfortable retirement, according to the Employee Benefit Research Institute's 2013 Retirement Confidence Survey. 

Tick Fever

Summertime means many things to creatures. For insects, warm weather signals a time to eat and breed. When they go about their business, far too often they cross paths with humans to our detriment. One species that can wreak havoc is ticks — specifically the American dog tick and Rocky Mountain wood tick. With their bite, they can transmit Rocky Mountain spotted fever, a bacterial disease, to humans. The infected ticks carry the bacterium Rickettsii.

When campers and hikers go to forested areas or fields, they are at a higher risk of coming into contact with these ticks. Where the dog tick is common, owning a pet increases the risk. Many times a person does not even know they have been bitten, as the bite is usually painless. The longer a tick is attached, the higher the risk of becoming infected. If crushed while still attached or if crushed between the fingers, there is a possibility of the secretions causing an infection.

Initial symptoms occur within two to 14 days after being bitten, and the person may feel as if they have the flu. Not all of the symptoms are experienced by everyone. Some of the symptoms experienced are: headache, high fever, muscle aches, nausea and vomiting, fatigue and rash. The rash usually begins on the wrist and ankles spreading into the palms, feet, up the arms and legs and into the torso area.

Early diagnosis is very important. Rocky Mountain spotted fever can cause serious complications and can be fatal if treatment has not begun within the

first five days of symptoms. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends Doxycycline as the first line of treatment for this disease. With clinical examination and medical history, hopefully your health care provider can get enough information to begin treatment even before the rash begins.

The National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases lists these prevention guidelines: "To help prevent Rocky Mountain spotted fever, you should avoid walking in areas of tall grass and brush where there may be ticks. If you do go into these areas, be sure to:

- Wear light-colored clothing.
- Tuck your pants legs into your socks so ticks can't get up inside your pants legs.
- Wear a long-sleeved shirt and tuck it inside your pants.
- Spray insecticide containing permethrin on boots and clothing. The effects will last several days.
- Apply insect repellent containing DEET to your skin. Because DEET lasts only a few hours, you may need to reapply it.
- Look for ticks on your body, including in your hair, when you return from hiking or walking.
- Check children and pets for ticks." NOW

- 2 boxes of Jiffy combread, cooked and cubed

 $1 \ 1/2$ cups chicken broth

Salt and pepper, to taste

I. Preheat oven to 350 F. Grease a 9x12-inch casserole dish.

2. Melt butter in a heavy skillet; add onions, celery and peppers.

3. Cover and cook until vegetables are tender, stirring occasionally.

- 4. Stir in green onion, seasonings and parsley.
- 5. In a large bowl, stir together crawfish,
- vegetables and corn bread.
- **6.** Add eggs and chicken broth. Mix thoroughly. Add salt and pepper.
- 7. Bake for 1 hour.
