





ANNIVERSARY! - By Virginia Riddle

Corsicana experienced a practically overnight business boom with the accidental discovery of oil in 1894. By 1898, there were 287 producing wells in the Corsicana oil fields, bringing new construction and downtown merchants such as Sanger Brothers.



In 1918, C.N. Olsen was Corsicana's first secretary of the Chamber of Commerce (the equivalent of today's president/CEO).

By 1902, street lights had been installed, and the Corsicana Transit Company had converted its service from mule-drawn cars to electric trolleys, while the Texas Electric Railroad provided hourly service to Dallas. A railway hub and cotton producing center, Corsicana's business climate was thriving despite the New York Stock Exchange having collapsed in 1893, marking the beginning of a period of national economic depression and recovery.

Several business-related organizations existed during this time. The oldest that Brad Cook, a Corsicana & Navarro County Chamber of Commerce board member, has documented was the Corsicana Commercial Club, formed in the 1890s. The Corsicana Booster Club, organized in the early 1900s, met in the Damon Building where Timbers is now located.

After a name change from "booster" to the Corsicana Business League, the two organizations combined their efforts under the banner, Corsicana Chamber of Commerce in 1917. Lowrey Martin became the first president, and C.N. Olsen was the first secretary (today's president/CEO). The new group joined the national Chamber organization in 1918.

From its beginning, the Chamber improved the shopping

experience for retail and industrial businesses' customers. One of the more memorable changes of the 1920s was the installation of downtown public restrooms. "Farming and ranching families coming to town to sell and buy on weekends had modern bathroom facilities and didn't have to use the stables for that need anymore," Dana Stubbs, local historian and genealogy librarian, said. "They could linger longer and shop, dine and have fun."

On September 15, 2018, the Corsicana & Navarro County Chamber of Commerce, a name that reflects its everexpanded role, will celebrate 100 years of its past and present support of area businesses, while looking toward a promising business climate. "We champion our business members and move them forward," current chairman of the board, Laura Capehart, stated.

Dr. Linda Timmerman, the 2007 Chamber board chairman, agreed, "The Chamber has been, is and will be the voice of this community. It represents the community and stands as the front door." Noting that commerce drives the area in many ways, Linda said, "Really the Chamber promotes our entire community."

Chamber leaders are typically trained by becoming volunteers, then committee chairs and board members. Linda moved upward through the ranks for years before becoming chairman. "Training happens by just 'getting into the mix.' During my chairmanship, we tried to create a synergy that didn't exist before," Linda explained. "We saw the need for all entities to work toward working together. It didn't happen overnight, and we're still working on it, but the synergy that has resulted has been very rewarding." Linda, working with many other Chamber leaders and members, has planted seeds of synergy that are now reaping rewards.


A visit to the Chamber's website or Facebook page gives members and visitors a look at the many different types of sponsored and promoted events, from golf tournaments to business-after-hours to ribbon cuttings for business openings to economic collaborations with different levels of government. "The Chamber has a history of networking with other area Chambers through organizations such as the North Texas Chamber Executives organization," Laura remarked. "We like to see what's working elsewhere and share our successes."

"Communication and transparency is important to the Chamber. Folks need to know the why of our decisions and know there are no personal agendas being met or drama in the decisions," Laura added.

Chamber, nonprofit and business members' events are announced via email with weekly reminders, so everyone can be involved. "You can't undersell the power of networking in a smaller community," Laura explained.



The Chamber's always been willing to evolve as business and communication means evolve," he said. "It's been interesting to see what the Chamber looked like 100 years ago. 

back of the female and neither of their faces is showing. "I just love things that are different," she said. "I know you can't see their faces, but I loved that picture from the time I first saw it. I just love that it's about the body."

Much of the artwork throughout the home is unique. On an adjacent table is a lamp with a base crafted to look like an acrobat holding the stem on his feet as he lies on his belly. In the living room, a pair of cherubs guards the fireplace. Among the items on the shelf next to them is a round piece of stone art that resembles the legendary Medusa.

"These are from our travels," she said. "Ed and I went to so many places like Africa and even The Great Wall of China. It was incredible, just incredible. You feel so insignificant. To know that it was created by humans is amazing."

Like any home, there are plenty of family photos. Carolyn's is no different. One is of her dad who has his own place in the world of archives. He worked on the Apollo project when the astronauts first walked on the moon, which earned him a place in the Smithsonian. "He never even talked about it," said Carolyn's son, Jason, who lives across the driveway from her. "He just wasn't that kind of guy, but that's really cool. He once told me he flew a bomber into the eye of a hurricane. I can imagine what an experience that must have been."

Along with artifacts, Carolyn's home is full of memories. Ed passed away in 2009, and in the corner of the couple's backyard is a memorial gravestone to him presented by the Veterans Administration. Ed was a military doctor, later becoming an OB-GYN. Though Ed was cremated, Carolyn likes having the backyard headstone as a way to visit with him each day.

Carolyn also often thinks of her

oldest son, Sean — who passed away in 1995 — particularly when she looks at one of many angel statues throughout the home and in the backyard. "When Sean died, I started to love angels," she said. "I just like the way they remind me of him."

Like the rest of the house, the backyard is small, but cozy, and relaxing. It features lots of plants and a variety of small statues, including one entire area that is an assortment of frogs.

And, returning to her love of faces, there is a rock statue of the face of Bacchus, the Roman god of agriculture, wine and fertility, copied from the Greek god Dionysus. It also doubles as a soothing fountain.

The entire house says "relax, enjoy the ambiance." But nowhere is that more evident than in the den. It was added by Ed's father, from whom they purchased the house. When he owned the home, the area was simply a screened-in porch, but also

his favorite part of the house. "He slept out here, and when Shadrack (his dog) wanted to go out, he would just pull a cord he had set up to let him out," Carolyn said, adding that even after they put up actual walls, "Ed loved to sit out here and look at his cattle."

The room is indicative of the entire house. Jason comes over daily for their Bible study and to just visit, sometimes talking about nothing in particular. "It's a nice cerebral vibe," he said. "There's not a lot of stress when you come over here."

Carolyn loves working in the green yard underneath the two tall trees that offer a plethora of shade. She also loves taking daily walks with her dog and cat. "I walk Bliss every day and Fatty walks with us, just like he's a dog," she said with a giggle.

Carolyn's life has included a lot of volunteer work. She was active with the Houston International Film Festival and MS Society of Houston, and is involved in the Corsicana FMC's card ministry. She has longloved helping others in her longtime business in Sugar Land, a workout facility, that allowed her to rub elbows with some celebrities. "All of the Houston Oilers' wives were friends with her," Jason said. In fact, she was good friends with the wife of former Oilers fullback Alonzo Highsmith.

Though she has always loved theater, she became connected locally when she taught as a substitute teacher at nearby Mildred High School in the theater arts department. "I loved those kids. Then, when some of them graduated they went to work for H-E-B, and I'd go there to get my fix visiting with them," she said with a laugh.

"It's funny how life takes us places we never thought we wanted to go," she said. "I never thought I wanted to leave the Houston area, but now I can't imagine life anywhere else but here." **NOW**

A Youthful Leader

What could possibly happen to a self-described "short, chubby little girl" who starts clogging? At age 14, she might become the director of the Corsicana Cloggers. Claire King is at least one of the youngest, if not *the* youngest, director of any clogging group in Texas. "I started clogging at age 10 for the skills taught, but I didn't get it," Claire said. "I had never danced before clogging. I wasn't the best dancer. At about 12 years old, I started to feel differently about the dances."

Before Claire's directorial predecessors, JC and Ashley Goodnow, moved to Georgia nearly a year ago, Claire was asked to take over the position. "I had taught a couple of songs as kind of a tryout without having an idea at the time that that was what it was. It was a total shock when she asked me to do this job. I agreed because I had daydreamed about doing it, but it was still a shocking experience," she recalled.

Claire counts Ashley, her first teacher, as a mentor, along with the group's founder and current member, Helen Griffiths. "Ashley never gave up on me," Claire recalled.

With dancer ages ranging from 5-99 years, Claire is leading dancers much older and more experienced. She also must teach her siblings, two sisters and one brother, who are members of the group. "I think my becoming the director actually made them feel more comfortable," Claire explained.

"If you can keep moving, you can keep clogging at any age," Darren King, Claire's dad, added. "I don't clog, however. I'm the roadie. I stay in the background."

The Corsicana Cloggers perform regularly around the area and in the Metroplex. Once a year, they attend and compete at a regional clogging conference. "I don't choreograph most of the dances. Most are already choreographed, but I'm working on some now," Claire explained. "Clogging focuses on the unity of the group. Even when you are working with a partner or dancing as an individual, you are still part of the total group."

She enjoys working with and teaching her students. "This is still new to me, but very enjoyable," Claire admitted. "I get to learn about different types of people and their learning and thought processes."

Currently, the group numbers around eleven, with membership fluctuating. Claire's planning a session for newcomers to learn the basic steps. "We encourage people to try clogging on a trial basis to see if they like it. New people don't have to purchase clogging shoes. They can wear socks or sneakers," she said.

The group meets at the Corsicana Senior Citizens Center on Tuesdays at 4:45 p.m. "We're self-financed," Claire shared. "Everyone helps with everything. The per-session charge is \$5 for an individual or family to participate. One couple is from out-of-town, but most of us are from around Corsicana. We enjoy what we're doing, and everyone's welcome."

Claire is the second oldest child of Darren and Sara King's nine children. She volunteers at a local food pantry and with the Cloggers. A Corsicana native, she's homeschooled and is working at an eighth-grade curriculum. Art, drawing and conducting research in those areas are Claire's favorite subjects. Her family participates in an area homeschool association's activities, as well. "I don't know what I want to do in life yet, but I know I don't want to be a bail bondsman," she quipped, referring to her dad's profession.

"Claire's a fashionist," Darren agreed.

Claire encourages would-be cloggers to try it, noting that "messing up" is allowed. "Clogging may look daunting, but it's really fun, and we rely on each other," Claire said. "Putting myself 'out there' mentally is a little scary, and it's still new, but I'm having fun, too."




 In a large pot, cook the broccoli for 3 minutes in boiling salted water; remove the broccoli from the water with a slotted spoon.






