#### Dear Readers,

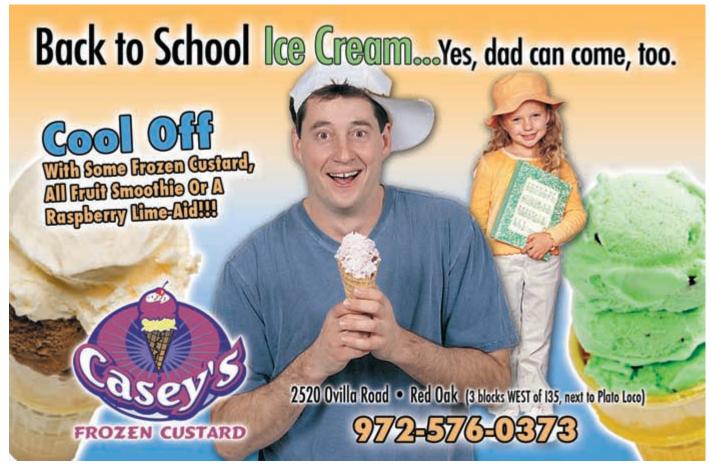

# A Brave and Living

Some of us handle trials and tribulations better than others. Then there are those like Michelle Lorea, who, when faced with life or death situations, inspire us all to not give up.

Michelle lives in Red Oak with her husband, Jesse, and three of their four children. She is a former business professional, describing herself as having always been a good, honest person and a regular church attender. However, in the spring of 2006, Michelle's faith faced a devastating challenge. That March, she was officially diagnosed with locally advanced stage 3 breast cancer. In a split moment, her world stopped.

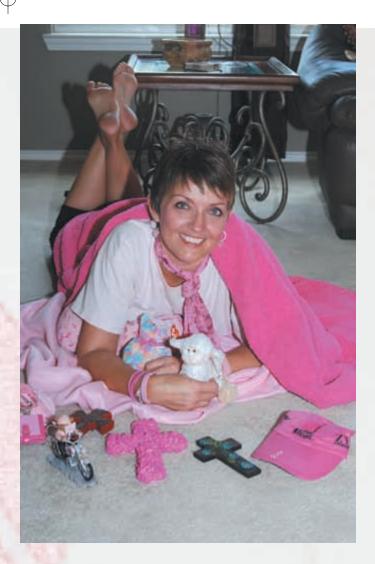
Six months before the diagnosis, Michelle had informed her doctors of a lump she had discovered during an exam. None of her physicians took her concerns seriously, because she did not fit the profile of a person who would have this disease. "No one in my family had ever had breast cancer, and I was considered 'too young' to have it," Michelle said. "So they continually refused to give me a mammogram, and told me what I was feeling during my exams was just a harmless cyst."

After months of persistence, Michelle's physician finally relented and ran some tests. When the results came in, the nurse confirmed Michelle's fears, giving her a hug and a prayer for strength.

"What the nurse did for me that day really helped set me strong from the get-go," Michelle said. This act was also a confirmation that there were some changes she needed to make in various facets of her life.

"When I was first diagnosed, I knew I had to get straight with God before I could do anything," Michelle said. "I knew I had nowhere else to go but on my knees." Hard situations were in her future, and she knew only God could help lessen the blows of her upcoming trials. Some of those trials were to be expected, others were not.

"My biggest struggle was telling the kids," Michelle admitted. "I really prayed hard about having to do this. At first, I was afraid about how they would accept the news, but Jesse and I decided to always be open with them because



we didn't want them to be left in the dark. So, we set up a plan on how we would help them cope."

Michelle tried to put a positive spin on the situation when sharing news, like the test results, with the children. At times, she used elements of humor to help them cope. "When I first started chemo, my daughter, Gabby, and I went out and bought matching hats and scarves," she said. "We made a pact that we wouldn't wear them until my hair started falling out. Then one day when I was in the kitchen, a big clump of hair fell right onto the counter. It was weird, but I ended up making a light-hearted situation out of it by joking with the kids that I would shave my head while they were at school. Later, when they came home to mom and her 'new look' we all had fun trying on my wig and taking silly pictures of the kids wearing it."

By giving her disease "positive spins," Michelle said she was able to "embrace" the situation. "I'm glad we tried to make things positive, because it really makes a big difference to you and your family when you can treat this kind of an illness as an adventure," she said.

When Michelle was thrown negative curveballs, her faith and her family continually helped her to hit home runs. "During my treatment, I underwent six rounds of chemotherapy and a mastectomy," she said. "I still worked a little while going through chemo, but eventually lost my job. That's when I decided I no longer wanted to be the kind of person my bosses and my job needed me to be."

The job, however, was not her only unexpected loss. At times, it seemed the disease was not only trying to take her health, but some of her relationships as well. "I lost friends through all of this," she said. "Many of the very people I thought would stand by me and support me the most, were the ones who left me high and dry during those times."

Amazed at how some of her closest friends had turned their backs on her, Michelle could still smile as she reflected on why she had to go through those losses. "Since all of this happened, I think, 'That's OK,' that I lost work and friends," she commented. "It's OK because it has changed me tremendously. And now I consider every situation to be a new and exciting opportunity, and I am a different and better person because of it."

There have also been many positive experiences for Michelle, gained through new friends and fresh perspectives. "Some of the people who I thought didn't care about me, are the very ones who came to my rescue," she confided. "I have really made some wonderful

new friends along the way. I have also discovered that the things I used to worry about aren't as important as they used to be. I realized the most important thing is to spend time with, and be there for, my kids."

Through her children, Michelle was able to make an unexpected new friend, her husband's ex-wife, Sharon. "After my decision to draw closer to God, I felt a little lost and had so many questions," Michelle said. "With that, I turned to Sharon because she is

a very strong, Christian woman. I knew she would be there to cry with me, teach me and encourage me."

Michelle is thankful for those who stood by her and credits her family for being her biggest supporters. "Something like this really affects the whole family and causes them to make sacrifices," she said. "My family sacrificed a lot. I am so thankful for my kids because they did chores and cooked dinners when I was ill, while my mom and husband gave me extra strength to carry on. Without my family, I wouldn't have made it."

Michelle wholeheartedly shared how the good experiences have outweighed the bad. "Although I hate how the kids have had to grow up a little faster because of this," she said, "it has caused us all to become closer. I now make every second here with them count. They're what keep me going, sane and laughing. During this time, I have been able to talk to younger people who have been diagnosed with the disease, and I've participated in events such as the Susan G. Komen walks," she said. "Also, my relationship with God is now totally different, and going through something like this really helped me realize just how important a relationship with Him is."

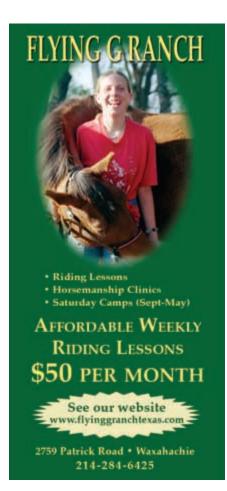

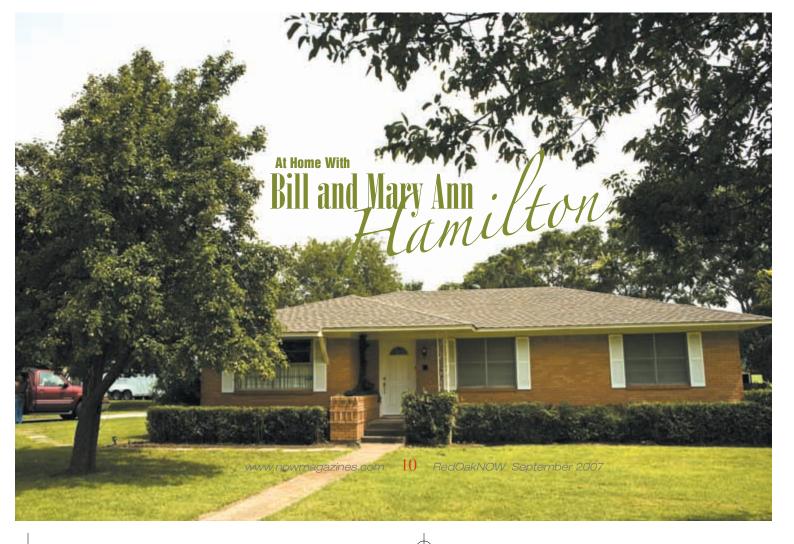

The Hamiltons' two children were in junior high when they decided to move, leaving the rental property on what is now known as Johnson Lane behind. "We really liked the Red Oak school district," Mary Ann







said, "so we looked for a home within the district."

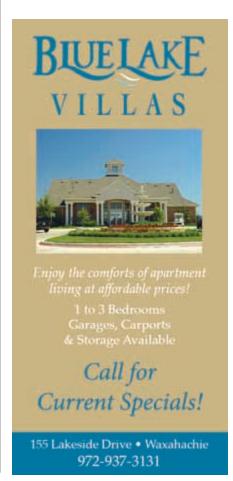
Bill and Mary Ann find great comfort in reminiscing. Country living has included many Sundays spent at Ovilla Road Baptist Church, where they are charter members. Memories also include 15 years of volunteer time Bill spent as fire chief with the Ovilla Fire Department and the work Bill and Mary Ann have both accomplished with the Texas Baptist Men.

Their boys grew up loving the country life, as did their three grandchildren. "Our boys raised cows," Bill said. "Our grandchildren raised cows. It was a wonderful time and place to raise a family. It was probably one of the most meaningful, important moves that Mary Ann and I ever made."

They are still taking an active role in rearing the fourth generation on the farm. The only difference is now they are doing it on just two acres. "Now, we are enjoying our 5 and 1/2











great-grandchildren," Mary Ann said, smiling proudly as she made reference to her sixth great-grandchild, who is due in January.

Family projects throughout the years have been popular with everyone – both old and young alike. Bill and Mary Ann wanted their great-grandchildren to know what happens when a seed is planted in the ground, so the family's project for the summer and early fall has been a backyard garden. "We wanted them to experience the harvest," Mary Ann added.

The children planted corn, tomatoes and pumpkins, as well as sunflowers. Mary Ann laughed aloud as she remembered



reading about gardening in a Neil Sperry publication. "We have done everything opposite from what the book says to do," she said. "We have walked on the corn and staked it back up, only to have a great harvest."

Bill pointed to the small patch of pumpkins that were already nearly as big as basketballs. "The kids wanted to grow their own jack-o'-lanterns," he said. "The pumpkins will be ready long before Halloween gets here, but I'm hoping the kids will let them keep growing to see just how big they'll get."

So many things have changed since 1975, beginning with the home's interior. Back in the late '50s, the home boasted

of attic fans. At the time of purchase, there were several window units in place. Bill and Mary Ann modernized it even further by upgrading with central heat and air conditioning. Mary Ann said that every room has been remodeled at least once since 1975. "I enjoy moving things around," she commented, referring to her oil paintings, which can be found in key locations throughout the home.

Mary Ann has a style all her own as she displays her own paintings alongside pieces she has found, as well as those painted and given to her by friends and neighbors. Her favorites are the ones she has painted of turkeys. Two tom turkey gobblers are what one sees when first entering the home. Another family of turkeys is found in the den, which also serves as the dining room when family gathers. They are colorful, and at first glance, appear as if they might jump off the canvas.

The home is cozy, warm and comfortable. The recliners and rockers



in the family room beckon visitors to come sit awhile. The hand-embroidered pieces hanging on walls and resting on tabletops, sofas and wooden benches only add to the country ambience. "We live in our home," Mary Ann said, as Bill shook his head in agreement. "We live in every single room." When family comes to call, it takes every single room to hold their large, ever-growing family.

When asked about collections, both

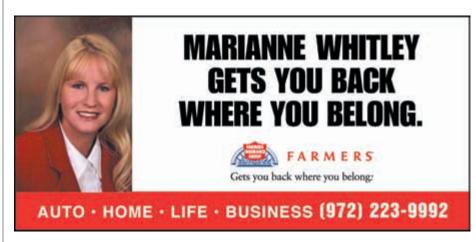




said they really do not have collectibles. After a few more minutes passed, Mary Ann remembered Bill's assortment of antique and classic cars. Since retiring, his hobby has included restoring his old cars, as well as vehicles that belong to some of his close friends. "I owned the Ovilla Service Center until 1996 when I sold it," Bill said. "My dad was in the car business, so I was raised around them. I grew up loving automobiles!"

That love is evident in the five cars he is currently working on. He made a firm promise that he would finish the restoration process on a 1934 Lafayette he has had for the 53 years he and Mary Ann have been married. "It's been a work in progress for at least 51 years," he said, with a smile. "It's time to get











serious. I hope to finish it before 2008 arrives." Mary Ann, also smiling, said she was "optimistic."

Bill did not hesitate to point out several heirlooms displayed in the family room. Mary Ann's parents collected four curio cabinets with the plan of passing one on to each of their four daughters. The lighted one Mary

Ann chose is filled with items, including Carnival glassware; a Waterford crystal bowl; a hand-carved, wooden ink pen presented to Bill by the city of Ovilla, a cup and spoon from the 2001 Bush Inauguration and several souvenir pieces from countries near and far. "Mary Ann's aunt was a doctor until a few years ago," Bill explained. "She

gave a lot of wonderful items to Mary Ann when she retired."

Mary Ann also pointed out a "lobster bowl" and a fluted fruit dish that dates back to the days when her paternal grandmother was rearing her own family. The hutches have allowed Mary Ann to display her red glass collection for all to see, while she keeps her red Blenco thumb print glasses in a safe place.

One of the most meaningful arrangements can be found in the main hallway. The school photographs of Bill and Mary Ann's three grandchildren are portraits of happy children. The evidence is found in their smiles. Mary Ann embroidered words from Psalm 144:12 and a commentary by Matthew Henry to represent what family means to the Hamiltons. "They are a reward from the Lord for raising our own children," Bill said. Mary Ann agreed. "It's been a good life," she said, thinking of each happy yesterday. "We are truly blessed." TOW

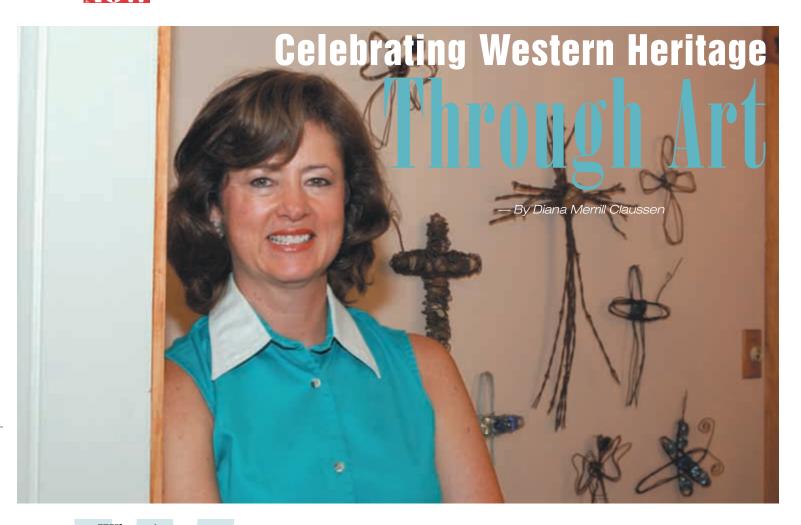

When it comes to all things Western, local resident Amber Parker lives the true Texan lifestyle. She and her husband, Lloyd, reside on two acres in a lovely ranch house in Ovilla with their son, Colton. Both the exterior and interior of their home, are the epitome of Texan heritage and flair.

Inside the Parker's home you will find a bearskin rug, along with various accent items made from cowhide, steer horns and even barbed wire. The outside of their home is just as warm and inviting. Amber said her residence would not be complete without the family's collection of handcrafted accent pieces, many of which, came from out-of-the-blue inspiration.

"Many years ago, I was looking through a magazine and saw a really nice horse sculpture made from bailing wire," Amber said. "I thought, 'Wow, that is really cool,' but then thought there was no way I could do all of that intricate work to create it."

Amber did not think about the sculpture again until she was browsing in a store one day and happened upon a cross made from the same type of material as the horse figure from her magazine. This cross inspired her as had the horse piece. She was determined to try her hand at making similar art pieces.

Deciding to make her sculptures from bailing and barbed wire, Amber ventured to her horse barn to collect the materials needed. She grabbed some bailing wire from her horse's hay bales and Lloyd made patterns for her to use from a block of



wood and four nail spikes. Then, Amber wrapped the wire around the spikes to create her own crosses.

Typically, Amber's crosses are made of bailing wire and rocks, which her son, Colton, helps her collect. The larger crosses, however, are made with barbed wire.

"I remember when I first started wrapping and making the crosses, I would strip the rust off of the metal so that it would be a little more shiny. Then my son, Colton, reminded me that I like rusty things," she said. In addition to the crosses, Amber also creates handmade cards, wire hearts, butterflies and dragonflies. She readily admits that creativity runs throughout her immediate family. "While I form my pieces from the metal wire, I like to leave signature twists on them to symbolically show that the piece is created from an actual wire."

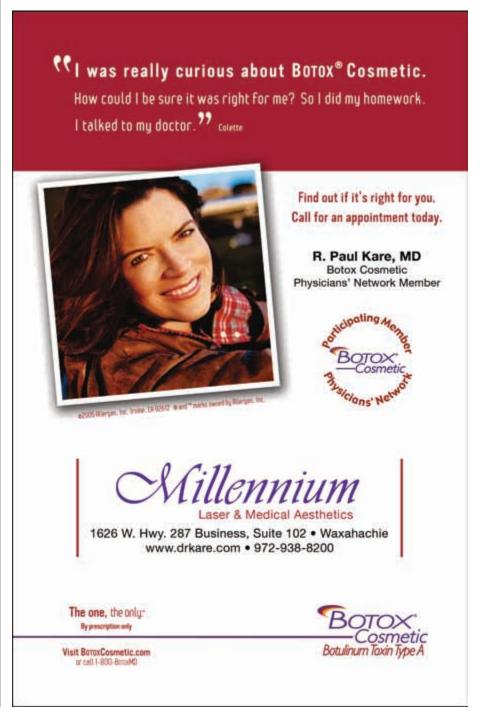

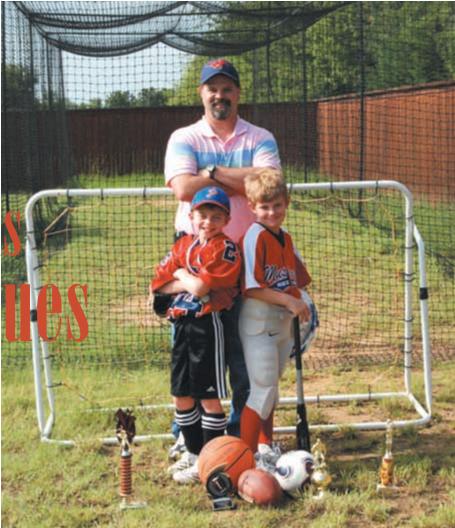




# The Legend of the Lea

## **Paying It Forward and** Leaving a Legacy

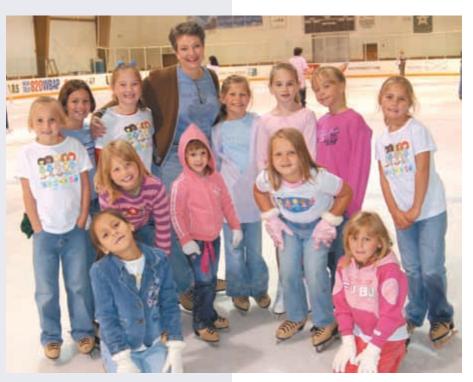

When author Catherine Ryan Hyde wrote the story Pay It Forward, Red Oak resident Terry McAdams was already living it. The main character of the fictional tale is a teacher named Reuben St. Clair who gives his class the challenging assignment to change the world. On the chalkboard, he wrote this instruction: "THINK OF AN IDEA FOR WORLD CHANGE, AND PUT IT INTO ACTION." He was encouraging them to give of themselves without asking for anything in return.

Terry McAdams has been a living example of this mission since 1982. She grew up "on the Texas side" of Texarkana, with working parents who had little time to offer volunteering for organizations or after school programs. For that reason, Terry said, "I just wanted to do what they couldn't."

"One day, I reflected on my activities and then told my husband I wanted my work to help have an impact and to make a difference to kids. That was just really important to me," she added.

Terry has been married for 26 years, and because her husband, Johnny, works at the USDA, they have been relocated frequently. Yet she never let the moves deter her from volunteering and getting involved in community service projects wherever they lived. One of her first big-hearted acts was to create a Girl Scout troop because the town where she was living at the time did not have one. "There's always something to be done," Terry laughed,

but the true challenge was to come when Johnny and Terry learned they were pregnant.

Most new mothers would have taken a hiatus from their community work, but Terry simply brought her son, Jake, into the fold and kept on her mission. Now that Jake is older, he is carrying on the legacy of serving others.

While there are many stories of Jake's own activism, Terry shared a recent inspiring event Jake experienced. While working with the Boy Scouts, Terry discovered a rehabilitation camp that offers therapeutic riding for children with special needs. At the camp was a horse named Trooper who was used as one of their therapy horses. To the outside world, Trooper was a slow, unappealing and uninspiring creature. To one special camper who was afflicted with a host of medical problems, Trooper was a hero, as was Jake the Boy Scout.

On that day, Jake was volunteering at the facility and he was charged with leading this special child on horseback around the riding arena. During her

ride, she started sitting a little higher on the horse, looked down upon everyone and experienced a thrill of empowerment, possibilities and hope. "That," Terry said, tearing up with tremendous pride, "was just amazing."

Motherhood did not hold Terry back from volunteering, but it allowed her to experience it on a whole new level - especially after she welcomed her second child, Anna Mae. Providing support to the Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, book fairs, library reading programs, booster clubs, the PTA, Bible school classes, Sunday school and substitute teaching were as regular to Terry as washing the morning dishes. Terry was also inspired to photograph the children at local Red Oak events.

"What I like to do is take 'pics' of our kids - positive things like that," Terry said. "Jake's Cub Scout leader even nicknamed me 'Snapshot."

Her history of serving others has been Terry's legacy for over 25 years. She is the quintessential model of paying it forward, yet she seems unaware of the

tremendous impact she has had as a role model to Red Oak's children and to society as a whole.

Her work, however, has not gone unnoticed by Red Oak Elementary School Principal Rachel Kistner, who asked her to become the physical education aide for the school. This, in addition to all of her other community service functions, would be enough to overwhelm most people. "It's what she does," her husband said. "She always wants to do something to help other folks. She just really cares about other people."

Terry humbly calls her commitment a passion rather than a volunteer spirit. It is this passion, she said, that leads her into new adventures.

"Somehow, I ended up as the school representative for the Mr. and Mrs. Red Oak Pageant," Terry laughed. Somehow, she also ended up as carpool- and den-mother, civic spokesperson, an acting photographer for local newspapers and, most recently, a Dolly Parton impersonator.

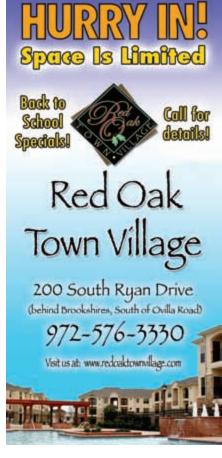

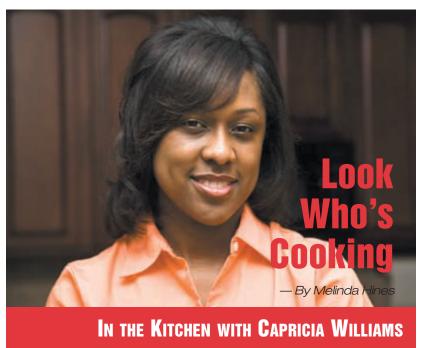

1 tsp. cornmeal

1/4 cup butter, melted

1/4 cup milk

1/4 cup lemon juice

4 eggs

9" deep dish pie shell

Place sugar, flour, cornmeal, butter, milk and lemon juice in a bowl and mix well with a fork. In another bowl, beat eggs with a mixer set to high speed. 2 Tbsp. butter, melted

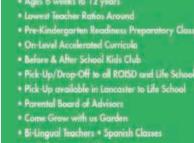
2 Tbsp. flour

- 1 1/2 lb. boneless steak, cut into thin strips
- 1 minced garlic clove
- 1/4 tsp. black pepper
- 1 2 large onions cut in half, then into 1/4" thick slices
- 1 2 large green bell peppers, thinly sliced 1 cup water

- 2 large garlic cloves, chopped
- 1 Tbsp. black pepper
- 1/2 Tbsp Lowry's seasoning salt
- 1 jar of Ragu, Old World Style
- 1 Tbsp. sugar
- 1 16-oz. container low fat cottage cheese, small curd
- 2 3 cups shredded mozzarella cheese
- 2 3 cups shredded mild cheddar cheese
- 1 1/2 cups shredded Parmesan cheese
- 1 2 cups shredded Velveeta cheese Pam cooking spray

Heat oven to 350 F. In large pot, boil lasagna noodles as directed on package. While noodles are cooking, add ground beef, onion, garlic, pepper and seasoning salt to a skillet. Cook ground beef mixture until done. Drain excess grease. Add Ragu and sugar. Simmer on low for five minutes. Set aside and spray large oblong Pyrex dish with Pam cooking spray. # **Providing for** Through a Living Trust

When we become parents, the good Lord instills in each of us a certain wisdom we never knew existed before. It is wisdom, that by virtue of hindsight, we realize our own parents had before us. Why then, should we allow this gift of good judgment to lapse when we die?

The answer is, of course, we should not. But how can our good judgment in rearing our children live on even after we have passed? You may be surprised to know a last will and testament cannot help you here — revocable living trust can.

#### **Unintended Beneficiaries**

Do you know where your property is going when you die? Chances are, if you have a will, you may think you know. However, the only thing a will guarantees is the probate process. Lawyers, guardians, creditors and the

court are all paid out of your estate before your children see a dime. Moreover, this process can last several months! Did you really intend to make lawyers, creditors and the court the primary recipients of your property? Of course not! How frustrating to gaze down from the Pearly Gates on the probate circus with Saint Peter "tsk-tsk-tsking" at your side. A revocable living trust avoids the probate process altogether.

#### "There is nothing so unequal as the equal treatment of unequals."

One mistake most parents make, despite their good intentions, is to leave their property to all of their children per stripes, or share-and-share-alike, granting exactly equal shares of their property to each of their children. The problem is, different children have different needs. Your 12-year-old, aspiring ballerina has an entirely different set of needs than your 25-year-old college graduate. You love your children equally, but that does not mean that their needs are equal. By executing a revocable living trust, you decide not only who cares for your children, but you decide how they are to be cared for. You appoint a trustee

or trustees (usually a valued friend or family member) to distribute your property to your children based upon each child's needs. The trustee's job is to appropriate the property to your children in the way you would have done it if you were still alive.

#### Providing for your children in one lump sum

You would not give your children a large lump sum of cash while you are living, because you want them to spend it carefully and learn how to use it effectively. So why, upon death, should you throw caution out the window? A revocable living trust allows you to distribute your property to your children exactly the way you see fit. An illustration may help you understand the importance of this principle:

Let's say you have a 23-year-old son. We will call him Ernie. Upon your death, after your will is probated and all the attorneys and creditors are paid, Ernie receives \$300,000 worth of property in one lump sum. You reared Ernie to know the value of hard work and, it was not an easy thing to do in today's world. Now, with one fell swoop, your work is undone. Ernie, the same Ernie who opened a lemonade stand in

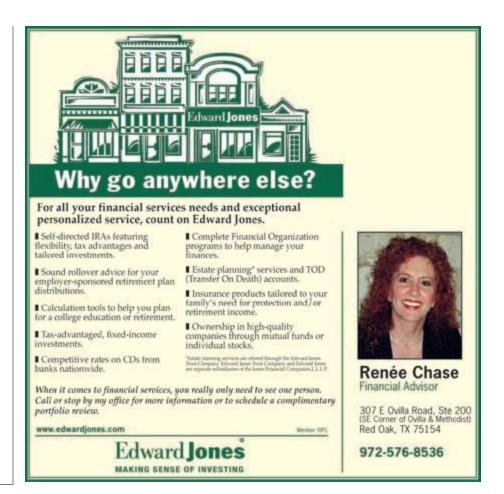
your front yard, falls victim to the temptations of bad investments and resting on his laurels (cue Saint Peter).

Why should death dramatically alter the way you care for your children? Using a revocable living trust allows you to distribute your property to Ernie carefully in a way that fosters the values you worked so hard to instill when you were living.

Death might stop you, but it should not stop your good intentions. Allow your good judgment to stick around a little while longer by executing a living trust.

# Diabetes:

# Millions Suffer From It and May Not Know It

Diabetes is a chronic disease affecting more than 20 million people in the United States. It is a condition that results from the body's inability to produce or properly regulate insulin, a vital hormone needed to convert sugar, starches and other food into energy.

Common symptoms of diabetes include an increased thirst, increased urination or change in appetite. Other frequent symptoms include fatigue, blurred vision, slow-healing infections and impotence in men. Diabetes can be caused by genetic and environmental factors, such as being overweight and inactive.

#### There are three common types of diabetes:

**Type 1** - The pancreas fails to produce insulin. Roughly five to 10 percent of Americans with diabetes have Type 1.

**Type 2** - The body fails to properly use the insulin that it produces. Type 2 is the most common form of diabetes,

affecting adults and sometimes children.

**Gestational diabetes** - Four percent of all pregnant women or about 135,000 cases are diagnosed in the United States each year.

"All patients with diabetes or pre-diabetes should work with their physician to develop a healthy diet and exercise program, as well as discuss medication options," said Dr. Jeffrey Astbury, internal medicine physician on the medical staff at Baylor Medical Center at Waxahachie and the volunteer medical director of the Baylor Diabetes Center at BaylorWorx Fitness Center in Waxahachie. He teaches his patients that "learning about diabetes is essential in managing you blood sugar," recommending all diabetic patients attend a diabetes education program.

Over time, high blood sugar can damage the blood vessels, nerves and organs and, if left untreated, can eventually cause serious complications or death. Following is a list of some of the most common complications:

- Increased risk for heart disease, heart attack, heart failure and stroke. According to the American Diabetes Association, over 65 percent of people with diabetes die from heart disease or stroke.
- A diabetic's risk for a heart attack is as high as someone who has had a

previous heart attack.

- Increased risk for diabetic retinopathy, a condition linked to blood vessel problems in the eyes. Diabetes is a leading cause of preventable blindness; cataracts and glaucoma.
- Increased risk for peripheral neuropathy, a condition caused by reduced blood flow to the nerves. This condition, brought on by high blood sugar, can cause nerve pain, burning and numbness.
- Development of serious leg and foot infections due to poor blood circulation, lack of oxygen and nutrients to tissue and nerve damage.
- Diabetic nephropathy, or kidney damage can cause kidney failure.

#### Risk factors for diabetes include:

- A parent, brother or sister with diabetes
- Age greater than 45 years
- Ethnicity (particularly African Americans, Native Americans, Asians, Pacific Islanders and Hispanic Americans)
- Gestational diabetes or delivering a baby weighing more than nine pounds
- High blood pressure
- High blood levels of triglycerides (a type of fat molecule)
- High blood cholesterol levels "While there is no cure for diabetes,





treatment usually involves medication, a healthy diet and exercise to control blood sugar and prevent symptoms and complications," Dr. Astbury explained. "But the good news is that complications are not unavoidable. With proper management of the disease, diabetes can be controlled."

If diabetes is left untreated, serious complications can develop. Some people can go for years without knowing they have diabetes, so if you are considered high-risk or begin to experience some of the symptoms mentioned above, do not wait — consult with your doctor right away.
