



Everyone has skills and talents, but not everyone knows how to utilize them. Willie and Phillis Alexander have a passion for using their gifts and enlightening others about the different ways they can make use of their own talents. They are leaders in their community and in their church congregation who use harmony, teaching and a little barbecue to inspire others to have a closer relationship with God.

Music has been part of both Willie and Phillis' lives since they were very young. Willie grew up in a musical family. "We sang with my mom and had two piano players in the family. I sang in a quartet in high school, but it did not stay together because people were not committed," Willie said. "At my home church in Tyler, I started a family tradition where the family would perform two musicals a year — one at our home church in Tyler and another at a selected church, both for fundraisers." Willie has continually organized and managed this program for 26 years.

Through the years, his job with Johnson & Johnson took him from San Angelo, Texas, and Chicago, Illinois, to Somerville, New Jersey, and Cincinnati, Ohio. Even with these moves, he always came back to put the musicals together and coordinate the a cappella-style singing at his home church. He continues to be dedicated to finding others who have the talent and desire to sing traditional Gospel without musical accompaniment.

Both the original cast and the name changed from the Midwest Travelers to Gospel Ambassadors. Keeping an ensemble together and available has always been part of Willie's mission. He is selective when he chooses members. "Willie has an exceptionally keen ear," Phillis said. "Once he heard a man named Glen talk at church. He said his voice might be good for the group. He was right, and Glen sang with the group for the first two years."

"Not just anyone can become a part of the Gospel Ambassadors," Willie said. "I want to make sure they have a love for Jesus and know they are doing God's work, while creating harmony consistently. This ministry is not for show." Over time, family members have rotated in and out of the group. Willie's daughter, Tunya, and niece, Angelia, have performed, along with Phillis' father.

In 2000, Willie was in a group that was invited to go and sing in a musical event in Prague. The group accepted the invitation, but then 9/11 happened and most of the members of the group declined the offer. Then in 2002, Willie organized an a cappella group to perform in churches, concert halls and theaters throughout Europe. "Large posters announced our performances," he said. "It was an amazing opportunity."

Phillis grew up in Brownwood, and then in San Angelo, where her dad was the pastor of a Pentecostal congregation for 45 years. Phillis played clarinet in school. She also took piano lessons and played the piano for the congregation as a teenager. She was a shy girl and did not like playing. "I, too, grew up in a musical family. My uncle played the organ. My dad played the guitar, and my younger

sister played the drums, too," Phillis explained. Her family moved to the Fort Worth area in 2004, when her mom became ill, to be close to larger hospitals. Phillis also worked for Johnson & Johnson and had met Willie many years ago. They reconnected when Willie was living in Alabama. "He came to Texas to get me," Phillis laughed. They married in 2008, and lived in Alabama for a year before returning to Texas.

In 2010, Phillis began singing with the ensemble. "I listened and hummed along with the guys as they practiced. Willie told me I could sing the top part," she said. "He told me to try the tenor. I love music and liked the sound of a cappella because it was different from what I experienced growing up. I also enjoyed traveling." The ensemble has traveled to many states including Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio, Mississippi and Louisiana.

The style of performance Willie prefers includes a call-and-response pattern. Willie, the lead singer, will sing a phrase and the other members in the group will echo the accompanying phrases. Willie searches for music and makes the selections that align with the group. "We keep the selections as close to the artists as we can but make it fit the personality of the group," he explained. "Since we sing a cappella, we have to add to and take out some elements to make it fit our style."



They do their best to accept any invitation. "But, our real mission is found in the Great Commission located in Matthew 28:18-19. We go where we feel God tells us to go," he shared. "We don't charge for our services, but we do let invitees know that we do need help, especially when traveling a significant distance or to other states." The group sings at many venues including anniversaries, nursing homes, weddings, funerals and retreats.

Encouraging others and helping people find their own talents in business and life is a common theme they share. They are extremely compatible in that respect. "I have always worked in human resources, starting as an intern and working my way up to director," Phillis said. "I have a passion for people, and I enjoy writing and developing policies and procedures."

Other activities Phillis enjoys are reading and sewing, but she admitted there is not enough time since she started a catering business called Sunday Dinner Catering. "It's difficult to organize two groups at a time," Phillis said, "but we coordinate schedules and make it work."

Another venture Willie feels led to pursue has been leadership development, team building and business coaching. His 27 years at Johnson & Johnson involved developing leaders, creating super teams and coaching for increased performance. After retiring, his love for leadership development and team building led him to establish his own company, but his real desire is to grow spiritually.

Willie and Phillis are involved in many activities that enhance people's lives. They both teach Sunday school and acknowledge they have a desire to lead people. They enjoy those teaching opportunities and will continue to guide others in their spiritual journeys. They keep their music, teaching and businesses held together on faith and will continue to wait on God's direction for each decision they make.



Sometimes trade-offs are good. Sometimes they are bad. Don and Varina Denman and their five children decided, good or bad, the trade-offs they made when they moved to Burleson were worth it for the value they provided. Although their kids had to leave friends and gave up an extremely spacious backyard, the family fell in love with the twice-as-big house and their new neighborhood's amenities, while making new friends quickly. Don and Varina started their family elsewhere and have lived in three other locations, but they like Burleson for many reasons. For 12 years, they have called it home, made memories and grown in the process.

"My parents were part-time antique dealers, and when our children were young, they offered to buy us a house," Varina said. "They are very generous." Varina had only two requirements. "When we moved here there were only 10 houses," Don said. "Now the whole development is full, and they are making more space

by removing trees to add more." The Denmans have seen many changes. "We could see the lake from our backyard before the houses were built behind us. The neighbors pitched in to fund a tall fence for our backyards."

son-in-law built the tall fence, so we would have more privacy."

Antiques from her parents complete the room's decor. "We haven't needed to buy any furniture," Varina said. "We honestly didn't buy anything ourselves. It all came from our families." A small desk that belonged to Don's grandfather sits in the corner. Don remembers him living in the Crazy Water Retirement Home in Mineral Wells.

The master bathroom is a deep maroon color with three western pencil art pieces displayed on the walls in barn wood frames. The artist, Paul Cameron Smith, lives in Weatherford. "We have painted almost every room with an accent wall," Varina said.

The two youngest girls are still at home and have colorful rooms upstairs. Jillian, 17, has a white bedroom suite that belonged to her great-grandmother. Her accent colors are purple, pink and aqua. She writes positive sayings and Bible Scriptures on a wall of mirrors. Janae, 15, decorates with black and red coverings for her bed and windows. Don made her floating shelves in the corner. She covered a coffee table in red velvet to create a bench under her window. One wall is dedicated to her favorite quotes from books like Harry Potter, Hunger Games and Divergent. It reaches from top to bottom. "I think she put some quotes from my books on her wall, also," Varina said.

The office is where Varina spends much of her morning writing contemporary fiction. She is beginning her fifth book. She has a three-book series and her fourth book, *Looking*





Glass Lies, is about the lies women tell themselves. "The story is about a woman struggling with low self-esteem after a divorce from an emotionally abusive husband. She returns to her hometown of Canyon, Texas, looking to heal," Varina explained. "It has tools to help women learn to like themselves again."

Next to the office is another bedroom painted dark green and blue. It is the extra space they need when the older kids and their spouses come to visit. Another DIY project is on the wall that Varina created when they moved in. She painted each member of the family in a large silhouette with a frame around it. "I used to do more crafts," she said. "Now, I focus more on my writing. If I have a project, the kids help.

"We've made this house even homier than our others," Varina stated. "It's truly ours." Don and Varina and all their children soon realized that their new life in Burleson outweighed what they relinquished. The memories created and new friends gained are priceless. Not every trade-off was welcomed, but they were worth the blessings that came after. **NOW**

EVERY OPPORTUN

This year, Old Town Burleson has been the scene of a host of new faces engaged in creative activities. Twice, the OTBA Art Walk has featured different artists — painters, musicians, street artists, wood sculptors stationed throughout Old Town. On July 8, patrons and employees of businesses in Old Town gathered for the Old Town Summer Sweep, raising litter awareness amongst people who walk in Old Town frequently. And this month marks the Third Annual Old Town Picture Show. Like last year, on three beautiful Saturday evenings, three free movies will be projected onto a gigantic, inflatable movie screen at 124 W. Ellison St. Guests are invited to bring their own blankets and lawn chairs and enjoy some good family time watching The Goonies, Sing, and Rogue One: A Star Wars Story.

The volunteers producing these events are all members of the newly formed Old Town Business Association, a not-for-profit organization of business operators who care about the people and place where they work. "The Old Town Picture Show is for the community. It's not about us," Monica Sheehan, studio manager of Painting with a Twist, said. "But it gives the people who are in Burleson a reason to stay in Burleson and shop local." The city coordinates the movies and offers OTBA members sponsorship opportunities, so their business names will be in front of people during the event.

That type of promotion is exactly what Art Brucks was looking for when he made an appointment with City Manager Dale Cheatham a couple of years back. A self-made mover and shaker who has worked a full-time job since he was 15 and got his start throwing newspapers at age 12, Art has always helped communities grow. He's had his hands and heart in almost every local chamber of commerce. In the early '80s, Art was building his State Farm insurance business from scratch in Crowley. Before he was 30 years old, he was elected president of the Crowley Area Chamber of Commerce. Later, Art headed the Burleson Area Chamber of Commerce. Now that he is in his early 60s, the business Art started 38 years ago operates from an impressive, remodeled structure on the curve in Renfro Street, at the intersection of Johnson Avenue.


Once established in that spot, he wanted to create a website to promote Historic Old Town Burleson as a destination. "I asked the city manager for a listing of all the businesses in the Old Town overlay, so that I could create a directory, as well as a food page and an entertainment page, so people who like live music could find out what bands are playing each week here at Old Texas Brewery or Spice Rack or Dalton's or Fresco's," Art said. The city gave him the listing and the map, but Art got busy and set the project on the back burner.

"Next thing I knew, the city had hired a person to be the Old Town & Tourism Coordinator," Art recalled. "I thought, *Hey, great, I can accomplish my original purpose but have the city's help, through Drew Pennywell, to make that come alive.*"

"Essentially, OTBA is an effort between the city and a steering group of Old Town business owners to collectively promote the district as a whole in order to help Old Town grow," said Drew, who organized the meetings for the past year. Now, OTBA has its 501(c)(3) charter and over 20 members. Some have home offices outside of Old Town, but the appeal for each is the same thing that excited Art.

"If you're a part of Old Town, it behooves you to gather with everybody else," he said, "to help promote this area as a place to get your teeth cleaned or buy your insurance or eat your chicken, because in Burleson these days, there are a lot of choices.

"One thing the OTBA does not attempt is to control the look and feel of Old Town," said Art, who is an appointed member of the board of the Old Town Standards Committee. But he does foresee that a large OTBA membership could exert influence on development.

As a brand new organization, OTBA adopted the vision from the city of Burleson to promote and encourage businesses to move here and make Old Town a vibrant place to live, work and play. "The city certainly helped us," Art said. "As time goes on, the membership will have to organically grow the vision away from the city." In Art's estimation, OTBA will one day grow big enough to behave like a chamber of commerce and will hire its own director.




OTBA hosts fundraisers to help achieve its mission. By the beginning of this summer, its bank account had accumulated \$1,200. The organization is offering limited edition Christopher Radko Christmas ornaments called *The Pride of Burleson* in many Old Town locations this month and expects to add more than \$3,000 to its funds.

Membership is open and is an affordable \$60 annually. "You get out of it what you put into it," Art explained. "We offer opportunities like our quarterly networking, where you can get to know





"You pay membership dues and get all kinds of exposure to people who don't know about the business or just need reminding," she said. "Also, the events they sponsor are discounted for OTBA members. The networking has also worked in our favor. Being at the meetings, I've found ways to work with the other businesses and get people to think of Old Town as more of a community."

Joining with others to accomplish good things is all part of a day's work for businesspeople who excel. So is leadership. Art's instinct to lead developed through a childhood that taught him success would not be handed to him. Art learned to make order out of chaos, while working to pay his way through college. He drove an ambulance for the city of Fort Worth and frequently was the first first responder to the scene of an accident. His sense of belonging to community compels him to make the best of his surroundings. With a day timer featuring an "Adapt or Die" sticker and a mantra of "Shop Local, Sell Global," the president of OTBA is teaching Old Town business leaders to take every opportunity to reach out to a global market. NOW


Know Your DIY Limits

Brighten Your Grandchildren's Financial Future

Mother's Day and Father's Day may get more attention, but National Grandparents Day, observed on September 10, has gained in popularity. If you're a grandparent, you might expect to receive some nice cards, but if you want to make the day especially meaningful, you may want to consider giving some long-lasting financial gifts to your grandchildren.

What might come to mind first, of course, is helping your grandchildren pay for college. You can choose from several college savings vehicles, but you may be especially interested in a 529 savings plan. With a 529 plan, your earnings accumulate tax free, provided they are used for qualified higher education expenses, such as tuition, books and room and board. (Keep in mind that 529 plan distributions not used for qualified expenses may be subject to federal and state income taxes and a 10-percent IRS penalty on the earnings.) You may be eligible for a state income tax incentive for contributing to a 529 plan. Check with your tax advisor regarding these incentives, as well as all tax-related issues pertaining to 529 plans.

One benefit of using a 529 plan is contribution limits are quite generous. Plus, a 529 plan is flexible: If your grandchild decides against college, you can transfer the plan to another beneficiary.

Generally, a 529 plan owned by a grandparent won't be reported as an asset on the Free Application For Federal Student Aid

(FAFSA), but withdrawals from the plan are treated as untaxed income to the beneficiary (i.e., your grandchild) — and that has a big impact on financial aid, a much bigger impact than if the plan was listed as a parental asset. Beginning with the 2017-2018 academic year, however, FAFSA now requires families to report income from two years before the school year starts, rather than income from the prior calendar year. Consequently, it might be beneficial, from a financial aid standpoint, for you, as a grandparent, to start paying for college expenses from a 529 plan in the year in which your grandchild becomes a junior. Contact a financial aid professional about the potential financial aid impact of any gifts you're considering.

A 529 plan isn't the only financial gift you could give to your grandchildren. You might also consider giving them shares of stock, possibly held in a custodial account, usually known as an UTMA or UGMA account. One possible drawback: You only control a custodial account until your grandchildren reach the age of majority, at which time they can use the money for whatever they want, whereas distributions from a 529 savings plan must be used for qualified higher education expenses.

Still, your grandchildren might be particularly interested in owning the stocks contained in the custodial account — most young people enjoy owning shares of companies that make familiar products. And to further interest your grandchildren in a lifetime of investing, you may want to show them how a particular stock you've owned for decades has grown over time. Naturally, you'll also want to let them know that stocks can move up and down in the short term, and there are no guarantees of profits but the long-term growth potential of stocks is still a compelling story.

You'd probably do whatever you could for your grandchildren. And with a smart financial gift, you can make a big difference in their lives. **NOW**

Crab Triangles

A hot appetizer.

I 6-oz. can crab meat, drained I stick butter I jar Old English cheese I/2 tsp. garlic powder I/4 tsp. seasoned salt I pkg. English muffins Paprika, to taste

I. Combine the first 5 ingredients, spread on muffins, sprinkle with paprika and cut into quarters.

2. Should you choose to freeze them for later, freeze them uncovered for 20 minutes, and then cover with plastic wrap and put back in the freezer. This keeps the topping from sticking to the plastic wrap. They'll stay good for up to 3 months.

3. Broil, watching carefully, until lightly browned.

Chicken and Spinach Roll-ups

4 chicken breasts, boneless and skinless Cooking spray
1 24-oz. can Hunts Pasta Sauce Garlic and Herb
Salt and pepper, to taste
1 lb. fresh spinach leaves
16 oz. mozzarella cheese, sliced
1/2 cup Parmesan cheese
2 Tbsp. red pepper flakes (optional)

 Pound out the chicken breasts as if for chicken fried chicken.
 Spray the bottom of a pan or casserole dish with cooking spray. Cover the bottom of the dish with 1 cup of pasta sauce. **3.** Lightly salt and pepper the chicken. Pile fresh spinach leaves and mozzarella slices on each breast, and then roll up. Place in pan or dish with the seam side down.

4. Cover with the remaining pasta sauce; bake, covered, for 35 minutes at 400 F.
5. Uncover and bake for 20 minutes more. Serve with Parmesan cheese and red pepper flakes, if desired.

Fowl Spaghetti

- 2 bone-in chicken breasts or
 - 4 chicken thighs
- I medium onion, chopped
- I green bell pepper, chopped
- I tsp. garlic powder
- 1 tsp. chili powder
- l tsp. oregano
- l tsp. salt
- l tsp. pepper
- I lb. spaghetti
- 3 large tomatoes
- I cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese

I. Cook the chicken in lightly salted water. Cool slightly; debone.

2. In a covered skillet, sauté the onion and green bell pepper; add chicken and seasonings. Allow to simmer; meanwhile, boil spaghetti in the water the chicken was cooked in.

 Cover the chicken mixture with roughly chopped fresh tomatoes; cover and heat until hot.
 Pour over the drained spaghetti and sprinkle with cheese.

Mexican Baked Beans

1/2 onion, chopped
1/2 bell pepper, chopped
2 Tbsp. olive oil
1 lb. ground turkey
2 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 Tbsp. Kitchen Bouquet
1 pkg. taco seasoning
1 53-oz. can pork and beans
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup ketchup

I. Sauté onion and bell pepper in a 3-quart pan with oil.

Add the ground turkey and brown. Add the Worcestershire sauce and Kitchen Bouquet.
 Add taco seasoning and pork and beans, after removing most of the surface liquid from the pork and beans can. Add brown sugar and ketchup.

4. Bake at 350 F, uncovered, for 55 to 60 minutes.




