



away and pull out my boots and the crazy socks that only I see. Yep, this girl is ready for some cooler weather, so I say, "Mother Nature, bring it on!"





The Ellis County Art Association has "new digs" in historic downtown Waxahachie. In mid-January, President Tina Bohlman and many art association members came together during the grand opening ceremonies to introduce art lovers and community members to their new gallery called Art on the Square. "We now have a new, modern place," Tina shared. "Local Ellis County artists are coming out of the woodwork. Since our open house, we've gotten many new members." In fact, active members grew from 50 to 94 in just the first three months following the move.

Growth was one of the main things the ECAA hoped to accomplish in the move. To be a member, an artist must be willing to commit themselves to the gallery by volunteering time each month in the regular operations in exchange for the opportunity to show their family-friendly artwork. "This is being active with the organization," Tina explained. "We like members to participate in and be active in the youth art show, which was held from April 4 through 12; the Paint Historic Waxahachie plein aire event that's held in the springtime; and the photo show, as well as seasonal events on the square and the ever-popular members show. We are looking for artists who are committed to the arts."

The annual Paint Historic Waxahachie event is open to any artist who paints plein aire in any fine art medium. All art must be created in the field. "This means no studio artwork," Tina said. "This year, participating artists agreed to paint on location for a minimum of two days during the official painting period — May 6 through May 14."

Plein aire artists who were registered by the April 1 deadline were encouraged to paint anything, anywhere, anytime up until the paint-out week in May. During the month of April, some of the best renditions from past plein aire events hung in the gallery as a prelude to this year's event. At the end of the week of on-location painting in May, the new canvases hung in the new gallery and the public enjoyed themselves during the viewing party.

Two longstanding ECAA members, Lynn LaRose and Kent Brewer, always look forward to the plein aire event, but as longstanding artists, they just love to put their passion on canvas. "They are a great representation of the art offered in the gallery," Tina admitted. "You can tell when painters like Lynn and Kent have had plein aire experience. It's the bedrock of a good painter."

Lynn is a seasoned oil painter who wants her artwork to evoke feelings. She has a history with her artwork, so she paints what she knows. "I just hope it moves those looking," she said. "I was known as the 'western artist' at one time, but not so much anymore. I paint landscapes, figures and objects. I no longer limit myself."



Her love for plein aire painting anytime and anywhere is apparent in the works she produces while on location here at home, as well as outside Ellis County. "The fast pace of plein aire painting loosens me up. I love it," she said. Lynn has painted bikes in Austin; old rusty trucks, a patio chair with a plant and a peanut mill just east of Austin; food trucks, signs, flowers along the roadways and yards in several locations; old buildings in Alabama; the Tyler Star Donuts location; and an

eclectic porch swing in Maypearl. "I named the Maypearl swing *Pastor's Porch*," Lynn remembered. "It won first place that year."

Other oils that have been painted in studio and displayed over the years include *Dancing with Rose Connolley* and *Chit Chat & Reticence.* "I painted Rose as if she were dancing her last dance, because based on the song, it really was her last dance," Lynn explained. "Although the lyrics represent a dark message, I painted young love. I try to find something good in the bad." The girl Lynn painted in *Chit Chat & Reticence* looked very much like her daughter, Worth. "The values and shadows of the photo I painted from allowed for great composition," she added.

As a realist, Lynn tells it like it is in conversation and in her artwork. She retired from the workforce three years ago, and now considers herself to be a full-time artist.

Kent began his artistic career with a portable sketch book that led to pen and ink renderings and finally watercolors. But, three years ago, he traded in his watercolors for oil. "I had been working with watercolors for 30 years," he admitted. "Painting in oil is an investment, but it's a change I wanted to try. I quickly learned it was much more forgiving than watercolors." Kent admitted he is not a patient person, so working with oils gives him the instant results he is looking for in his art. "By painting with oils, I finally figured out what I was doing," he confessed. "Once I stopped 'running off the road,' I was able to find my place in the world of oil painting."

His artistic abilities were first noticed when he "dabbled in drawing" with his cousins. "We dabbled in comic books," Kent said with a smile. "We worked



In studio, Kent paints mostly landscapes from photographs he's taken on trips to rural Ellis County, Galveston and the Big Bend area. This year's plein aire event was his eighth year to participate. Last year, he won Best of Show with one of his onlocation landscapes — *Escarpment View*, painted on Anderson Road just west of Waxahachie proper.



Kent provides "atmosphere" in his paintings. He likes to paint the "offin-the-distance shadows." "You don't need a majestic mountain for a majestic painting," he stated. "It could be as simple as a tree standing alone." He is constantly striving for a looseness and simplicity in his creations. "I want each person to interpret my paintings in their own way," he shared, "allowing the brain to fill in the blanks that are created by less detail."

The new location was very much a positive move with positive results. "People actually know we exist," Kent said. "You can't beat the beautiful view of the courthouse and the large windows that make Art on the Square airy and inviting."

Each ECAA member also feels it's a fair trade to work a few hours a month. For them, it's not really work because they get to talk about what they love — art. **NOW**



"Some of these girls went on to play club at the varsity level and even college," she said. "I still keep in touch with many of them."

In fact, Mary's first love was soccer. She was a standout player at Crowley High School, but Southwestern Assemblies of God University did not have a women's soccer program then, so she tried out for and made the volleyball team. She received her bachelor's degree from Dallas Baptist University, where she did play soccer her junior year of college.

"As a player, soccer is my passion, but I love coaching volleyball," Mary said. "Just being able to coach those girls and make a difference in their lives is absolutely wonderful."

Those feelings are reciprocated. Mary has left an impression on both players and their parents. "Mary is an amazing coach and mentor to these girls. She leads the girls with passion, heart and soul. As parents, we couldn't ask for a better person to love, lead and coach our kids," said Dana Holler, whose daughter, Skylar, has played for Mary for three years.

"Coach Mary is sweet, loving, respectful, kind and so much more," Skylar added. "She has faith in every part of you. If you ever say, 'I can't,' she'll say, 'Of course you can.' At the end of the day, it doesn't matter if we won or lost. All that matters is that we tried our best."

Mary has coached a variety of sports, including soccer, baseball, softball and volleyball. She has coached her own



children, 11-year-old daughter, Peyton, and 9-year-old son, Kade, in volleyball and soccer. Mary's entire family is athletic. Along with herself, Peyton and Kade, Mary's husband, Rick, was formerly a skier while growing up in upstate New York.

She is still the assistant coach for Peyton's club team, the Bandits. She also previously coached Bullseye, Peyton's team at the Y, for five seasons. "Each season, I'd tell them, 'We're getting closer to the target," Mary said. "That's why they were named Bullseye."





The name is also appropriate for the mission of the YMCA sports program. Mary feels it is a great place to form a foundation in sports. "It provides children and youth opportunities to be active, learn, grow, be a part of a team and most importantly, have fun," she said. "It takes everyone doing their part to pull off a successful season."

Mary noted that research from the University of Oklahoma found the top four role models for high school athletes are their parents, coaches, teachers and siblings. Mary qualifies in three of those categories. "I understand the responsibility coaches have and believe it is one of the primary ways I am able to make an impact," she said. "My goal for my players is to walk away each season a better athlete, teammate and most importantly, a better person. I also want them to know they are loved and valued."

She has also coached at the junior high and high school level at Faith Family Academy in past years. She was a student assistant at SAGU, as well. "Myself and another newly graduated student coached the men's soccer team, of all things," she said with a laugh.

Among Mary's coaching highlights was when Peyton's team played at SAGU. It was on the very same court she had played on years ago. "Who would have thought one day I'd be coaching my daughter in the same gym where I played?" Mary said, almost shedding a tear. "That's one of the more special moments coaching has brought me."

And there have been many special moments. She recalled one instance where it was hard to coach a match, but she battled through, teaching herself and her team a valuable lesson. "I had a

dear coach friend who passed away last year, and I had a match with my girls that weekend," Mary explained, this time not bothering to hide the tears. "We dedicated the match to him. It was a championship match in a tournament, and we went in as a lower seed, but won. After the match, I told them, "Even if you don't touch a volleyball this week, touch someone's life.""



Much of Mary's dedication to coaching comes from memories of when she was young. She recalls the many coaches who shaped her own life. "Much like we took our parents for granted, we took our coaches for granted sometimes, but now I look back and realize the difference they made in my life," she said. "It's my turn to pay it forward."

She has thought about returning to school to get a master's degree in sports psychology. She'd also like to perhaps try coaching at the college level someday. "I love the mental side of sports. Your thoughts become your attitude, and your attitude becomes your actions," she said. "I just want to help those individuals who range in age from 18-22 navigate the waters of young adulthood. That's when they will be making major life decisions, and I would like to help them find their way."




In the master bedroom is an array of dolls created by Stephanie's mother, which rest on the bed, and her wedding box, which is still very much on display. This includes the wedding cake topper she had found so many years prior to their wedding.

But it is in the main room, an open concept living, kitchen and dining combination, where the couple mounted treasured crosses they acquired from family, friends and their own travels, setting the tone for what's beyond. Great French doors open to a lovely 10-acre pasture. The "kids' corner" for their five grandsons, includes swings, teeter-totter and a fort that is carefully set up under a canopy of trees, while cows and a donkey, who loves peppermint, graze in the background.



Together, they also "reclaimed" all the stones from the pasture to create their garden of rocks, lining both the back patio and the front walk. "Our song is 'Broken Road' because that is how we came together," Stephanie said. The road leading to their home, however, is so full of promise. Beyond the street lamp Jay had designed for his family, always offering light in the darkness, rests a plaque that reads, *Memaw and Papa's Farm: A place where cousins go to become best friends.* "This is our dream for all of our grandkids."

"With everything that has happened, how we met, what we've been through, we feel so very blessed," Jay shared. "Truly blessed." In life, doors may close, but the doors in Jay and Stephanie's home are always open. **NOW**





• Look above for a simple fix. A step above just replacing light fixtures and lamps, swapping out your ceiling fan can alter the entire look of your room. 



No More Sleepless Nights

Reversing negative side effects of sleep apnea is important for quality of life. — By Sandra Strong

As you awaken each morning, are you feeling fatigued before your feet ever hit the floor? You could be suffering from sleep apnea. Without a proper diagnosis and treatment, people with sleep apnea could easily stop breathing hundreds of times every night. This decrease in breaths prevents the brain and other tissues in the body from getting the proper amount of oxygen needed for a restful night's sleep. "When people sleep well, they look rested," Dr. Scott Clinton stated.

The most common form of this disorder — obstructive sleep apnea — happens when the soft tissues at the back of the throat collapse, causing the airway to be blocked during sleep. "The blockage is mainly caused by the tongue," Dr. Clinton explained. Central sleep apnea is the second form. It takes place when the brain does not communicate to the muscles to breathe. "Studies show that more than 50 percent of Americans snore, and 1 in 5 has some form of mild sleep apnea. Simply stated, sleep apnea means breathing stops for at least 10 seconds while you are sleeping," Dr. Clinton reiterated. "People have suffered from sleep apnea for a long time, but now we are better able to identify and treat sleep apnea in ways that are life-changing for our patients."

Dr. Clinton, Dr. Nick Acosta and Dr. Kasey Hawkins, along with the staff at Waxahachie Family Dentistry & Dental Sleep Medicine, are educating their patients on the causes, risks and treatment involved in sleep apnea.

Sleep apnea is diagnosed through what is commonly known as a sleep study. The results of this study then indicate the severity of sleep apnea as mild to moderate or severe. Patients who are diagnosed with a severe case of the disorder are referred out, so they can be fitted with what's known as a continuous positive airway pressure (CPAP) machine.

If a patient is diagnosed mild to moderate, Waxahachie Family Dentistry & Dental Sleep Medicine can help reverse the negative effects of sleep apnea with a small dental appliance that's fitted to the patient's mouth. "The appliance we offer moves the jaw forward," Dr. Clinton explained, "opening the airway and allowing the patient to breathe normally."

There are many issues associated with obstructive sleep apnea. They include snoring loudly, insomnia, difficulty concentrating, dry throat, morning headaches and general all-day fatigue. "One of the biggest issues is excessive daytime sleepiness," Dr. Clinton shared. "This occurs because your body is constantly having to wake you up during the night to breathe. It's like being poked 30-40 times per hour while you're sleeping. The patient doesn't remember being awakened." Other long-term consequences of the disorder include high blood pressure, diabetes and irregular heartbeats. Gender, smoking, old age, heart disorders, weight and race can all factor into whether a person could develop sleep apnea or not.

Fortunately, the adverse side effects of snoring and sleep apnea are no longer something people "have to live with." Just because others on your family tree were snorers, doesn't mean you should suffer the side effects of sleep apnea. "A good night's sleep adds to the overall quality of life," Dr. Clinton said, "and it can also add years to your life."

When Toenails Hurt

The affected girl watched her big toe grow swollen and bruised-looking with a bloody discharge crusted around the cuticle line. She flinched as she pulled on her shoes. As a sufferer of an ingrown toenail, it was time for her to see a doctor. An ingrown toenail is when the side of the nail begins to grow downward into the skin, causing inflammation. The medical term for this is onychocryptosis. If not treated or cared for, the toe can become infected.

This condition commonly affects the big toenail, although any of the toes can be affected. The main causes of onychocryptosis are tight-fitting shoes or tight socks that apply too much pressure to the area causing the nail to curl into the skin and improper trimming of toenails. When the toenail is cut too short or the edges are rounded, the skin can grow over the nail and produce problems. Fungal growth and deformities of the foot or injuries to the toes can also create this condition.

The symptoms of an ingrown toenail are redness, swelling and pain. If the condition is a mild inflammation of swelling and tenderness, you may be able to treat it yourself. Soaking your foot in warm water for three to four times a day for about 15 minutes each time can bring some relief by helping to reduce the swelling. Applying a topical antibiotic can promote healing and lessen the possibility of infection. Try to keep the affected toe protected as it heals, but wear open-toed shoes during this time or shoes that do not press on the toe.

If the swelling, redness and pain increases, along with drainage containing pus from the ingrown nail, an infection has likely developed. This needs the attention of your family doctor or a foot specialist called a podiatrist. If you have nerve damage to the limb, diabetes or circulation problems, you should see your doctor right away. Oral antibiotics may be prescribed. In some cases, if the ingrown nail does not heal or keeps coming back, removal of part of the nail may be necessary.

In order to avoid having this condition, it is important to take care of your toenails properly. Always cut nails in a straight line that is even with the edge of your toe. Avoid ill-fitting shoes. Shoes that constantly press down on the nails can cause ingrown toenails. Keep your feet clean and dry. Change your socks daily. If any changes in the nails are noted, take care of them early to avoid possible painful consequences. **NOW**

Salmon Patties

Makes 6 patties.

- 1 14.75-oz. can boneless salmon
- 1/2 cup cracker crumbs
- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- 3 Tbsp. Miracle Whip Salad Dressing
- $1/4\ \text{cup}$ onion, chopped
- I cup yellow cornmeal
- 3 Tbsp. margarine or butter

 Drain and separate salmon into flakes. Add all the other ingredients except the commeal and butter; mix well.
 Shape mixture into rounded patties; roll patties in the commeal.

3. In a skillet, add the butter; cook patties in the melted butter for about 3 minutes on each side, or until the patties are golden brown. Remove the patties; drain.

Baked Potato Soup

- 4-6 large baking potatoes
- 2/3 cup butter
- 2/3 cup flour
- 6 cups milk
- 3/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- l bunch green onions, chopped
- 12 slices bacon, cooked and crumbled (divided use)
- 1 1/2 cups cheddar cheese, shredded (divided use)
- 1 8-oz. tub sour cream

I. Bake the potatoes; cool. Scoop out the pulp; set aside.

2. In a large stockpot, melt the butter over low heat; stir in the flour until mixture is smooth. Cook for about 1 minute.

3. Add the milk; stir constantly until mixture bubbles. Add the potato pulp, salt and pepper.
4. Add the green onions, 1/2 cup bacon and 1 cup cheddar cheese; stir and cook until cheese is melted.

5. Add sour cream; add extra milk if needed. Let simmer for 3-5 minutes.

6. Use the remaining bacon and cheese as garnishes.

One Pot Macaroni and Cheese

1 1/2 cups macaroni, uncooked

- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1 3/4 cups milk
- 1 8-oz. pkg. Velveeta cheese

 Cook the macaroni per the package directions. Remove from heat; drain.
 Add the butter and salt; stir to coat the macaroni. Blend in the flour.
 Add the milk; cook over low heat until the mixture boils. Remove from heat; stir in the cheese until it melts.

Orange White Chip Cookies

Makes about 3 dozen.

- 2 1/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 3/4 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- I cup unsalted butter, softened
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed
- 1 large egg, room temperature1 6-oz. cup Nestle Toll House white
- morsels
- I Tbsp. orange zest, grated

I. Preheat oven to 350 F; in a small bowl, sift flour, baking soda and salt.

 In a mixer's bowl, beat butter and both sugars for about 3 minutes or until smooth.
 Add egg to sugar mixture; mix well. Gradually add the flour mixture; stir in the morsels and orange zest.

4. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper; drop cookie dough by rounded tablespoonfuls onto baking sheet.

5. Bake for 10-12 minutes, or until cookies are a light golden brown; cool on the baking sheet for 2 minutes. Move to a wire rack to cool completely.
