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

### **EDITOR'S NOTE**

Happy birthday, Nannie ...

This month, my grandmother would have been 100. She's been gone a long time now, but just think how the world has changed in that time. When she was born, there had only been one World War, and it was supposed "to end all wars." The stock market hadn't crashed yet. Prohibition was still a thing, and flappers were the height of cool. The first helicopter flew just a few months before she was born. Yankee Stadium was brandnew, and Babe Ruth was the biggest thing around. Queen Elizabeth's *parents* had just married. The first velociraptor fossil was discovered. Ireland and Greece had just become countries. And shortly after she was born, Walt Disney started his company.

Her family moved to Dallas during the Great Depression. She lived in the days before indoor plumbing, but saw man walk on the moon. She saw a president assassinated in the city she called home, and saw the Cold War start, grow and finish. She was born in a world where telephones and cars were rarities, and lived to see computers become commonplace.

Since she passed, every toddler has a cellphone and a tablet. When she was little, girls filled their hope chests to be ready for the day they'd marry. Now we plan destination weddings in Cancun and expect the guests to foot the bill! She dated soldiers and sailors in World War II and almost married a paratrooper, who died in France. She wore her best black dress on her wedding day, but she did get married on the radio! She survived the Greasers, the Hippies, the Yuppies, the Goths and the Emos. She didn't live to see self-driving cars, but she wouldn't have liked those anyway.

What will the next 100 years bring?

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Zyra Washington wanted to go to college, just like so many other young people. But the idea of graduating with crushing debt was not appealing. "My parents instilled the desire to go to college. By about middle school, I decided that was what I wanted, too. But I didn't know where, yet. It was either Prairie View A&M, where my daddy attended, or Grambling State University. In my sophomore or junior year, I decided on Grambling, because that's where my mother and my pop attended. I started really trying to figure out how to pay for my education in my senior year. Zyra realized, right away, that she would need multiple sources of funding.

"One of the first things I did was to compete in the Miss Jabberwock pageant sponsored by my mom's sorority, Delta Sigma Theta. The pageant funds their scholarship program. I earned half of the money raised for scholarships. I won the pageant and earned enough to pay for my freshman year. That's when I said, 'I can do this!' Now Delta Sigma Theta is my sorority, too."

Zyra enlisted the aid of her mother and pop in tracking down scholarships she might be eligible for. "I applied for scholarships from different alumni associations, ones based on ethnicity, ones tied to specific locations, my major, my GPA. Some of the scholarships we found were very specific and had very unusual requirements. One that I did not get was for relatives of veterans. My grandfather and brother are both veterans, so I applied. The application wanted you to tell what the veteran meant to you in your life. Many of the scholarships I received, I got because I was the only person to apply for it. Most of them were for small amounts, but they add up. And I would reapply for all the ones that I got, year after year, because I was still eligible. I got a scholarship from my church, Antioch Fellowship, three times, and three more from other churches."





Zyra realized that applying for so many scholarships was a lot of hard work, so she worked smart. "Many of the applications ask the same questions, so I wrote a basic essay, which I could adapt. My model essay had my name, college major, GPA, organizations I was involved in and my future goals. Most of the applications asked why I wanted the scholarship or how it would help me or what it would be used for. My standard answer was that I wanted to graduate debt free. My essay was one single-spaced page. I could change the spacing for a double-spaced essay or delete words if they wanted 500 words. Then I only had to answer questions specific to that application.

"One scholarship I applied for was from the Luther Vandross Foundation. I had to make a video for that one. It was only about a minute-and-a-half, so I talked about my future goals and how I wanted to graduate debt free. That was supposed to be a \$2,000 scholarship, but they ended up awarding me \$5,000."

Scholarships were not Zyra's only source of funding. "Of course, I applied for federal student aid and got about \$3,000 a year through Pell Grants. I had work-study in my senior year. I also got my out of state tuition fees waived due to being a legacy student at Grambling. Not all schools do that, but if you find one that does, it helps.

"If I had to take a guess, I'd probably say I applied for 200 scholarships. That feels like a lot, but over the course of four years, and the ones I reapplied for each semester — including the ones I didn't get — it adds up. You need to choose wisely which ones you apply for. College is expensive, but you






don't have to take on that burden, and neither do your parents. My parents probably paid \$500 out of pocket. If you work together, and split up the work, a parent and child can finish the application for most scholarships in about an hour."

Zyra has advice for finding scholarships. "First, check with your college's alumni associations. I have to give a big shout out to my multiple Grambling State Alumni Associations for blessing me with numerous scholarships over my four-year journey to be able to graduate debt free. Grambling had a page on their website for finding scholarships. I found a number of scholarships through this website. But my parents also spent time looking for scholarships for me. It's important to reword your searches if your first search doesn't get many results. The Thurgood Marshall College Fund, the United Negro College Fund, the Dallas Metroplex Council of Black Alumni Associations and the Robinson House Association all have very helpful websites for finding scholarships. I feel like there are more scholarships for women of color, but it depends on the field. Don't be afraid to ask for help. Don't give up. I was able to do it, and my patience became real thin sometimes!"

Zyra's advice for anyone wanting to do what she has done is simple. "Trust God. Keep God first. He has a plan for everyone, and He will make a way. I don't know how many times I was looking at a bill and saying, 'How am I going to pay for this?' A week later, another scholarship would show up. Stay focused on your goal. I know it's not easy. It's definitely hard, but it can be done. I'm definitely not the first to do this, and I won't be the last." NOW



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
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
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


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## BRIGHTENYOUR EVENINGS

On the patio, around the pool, enjoying a barbecue or just watching the kids play, Texas days are extended further into the evening with the addition of any of the many outdoor lighting options. There are a lot of choices to consider, from 120-volt, hardwired flood lights, to low voltage wired systems and finally, solar powered lights.

For years, we have used wired flood lights, mounted to the corner eaves of our homes to provide light just for walking through our yards, and also for security. A wellilluminated yard may deter would-be burglars, as well as discourage destructive nocturnal pests. These lights are generally 120-volt systems and may include both sensors to only come on after natural light fades and motion sensors. On some models, the motion sensor will turn the light on from complete darkness, but often today, the lights will have a low-power mode, and the lights will come on to their

fullness when a motion sensor is activated. These lights may also be set with timers. While 120-volt systems have been the norm for many years, the advent of LED lights and small solar panels may be a more cost-effective option. Small solar panels may be attached to the light with a small wire, enabling the light to be under the eave and the solar panel on the roof.

Path lighting is an option for a safe way to navigate around the yard with a minimal amount of soft to moderately bright safety and landscape light. The low-voltage systems require a wired installation with a transformer to change your 120-volt house current to a 12- to 15-volt system. About the only drawback to this system is the wiring. Wiring needs to be buried between the lights — and, of course, consideration has to be given to avoid damaging the wires when working flower beds or doing other yard work. The solar option comes into play again with path lights. The investment into quality solar-powered path lights has become very economically attractive, and the lights are available for purchase either individually or in sets. Typical installation may only require driving a metal or plastic stake into the ground and attaching the light to the stake. The solar panels are built

into the top of the individual lights and power rechargeable batteries. While there are some path lights that include motion sensors, most only include the optical sensor that turns them on at dusk and off at dawn.

A popular option for patio lighting is string lights. These are typically low-voltage lights that emit a warm color that will add to the ambience of outdoor meals around the grill or firepit. The lights may be strung just about anywhere and may hang permanently from the eaves of the home around the patio, or loosely over the tables and chairs from the corner posts of an outdoor pavilion or gazebo. Again, if you are not interested in a permanently wired system, the portable, solarpowered option appeals to many and allows the string lights to be placed in different areas as your outdoor events may require. These lights are often seen illuminating personal campsites for both RV and tent campers.

Deck lights are small, often recessed lights that are installed around the perimeter of the deck surface, as well as between the individual steps of stairs and along the side railing. Deck lights provide safety against trip and fall hazards, as well as providing accent light for garden plants that surround the deck. A low-voltage system is usually a good option, and the lights are typically wired together rather than operating from a single powered source, whether it be solar or a transformer from the 120-volt system.

While all of the lights discussed up to this point have been of the floodlight variety, spotlights may also play an important role in outdoor lighting for accenting pool and garden areas. These lights are also known as "up-lighting" and shine narrower beams to highlight plants, statuary, garden ornaments and water features. These lights may typically be chosen and installed when a major landscape project is being constructed, such as a pool or new patio. However, LED lights that stand alone and may be solar powered are becoming more popular and are economical, widely available and easy for the do-it-yourself homeowner. NOW

Rick Jaynes has been serving area families in their time of bereavement for 25 years. 

## Red Velvet – Waynesboro Edition

#### Cake

- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 cups canola oil
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. vinegar
- 2 oz. (2 bottles) McCormick red food coloring

- 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- I tsp. baking soda
- I tsp. salt
- 2 Tbsp. HERSHEY'S Cocoa Powder
- 1 cup whole buttermilk
- I tsp. vanilla extract

#### Red Velvet Frosting:

- I stick salted butter
- 1 8-oz. pkg. cream cheese
- I tsp. vanilla

### I pkg. confectioner's sugar, siftedI cup chopped pecans (divided use)

- **1.** For cake: Preheat the oven to 350 E
- **2.** Prepare 3 9-inch cake pans with flour baking spray or by coating them with shortening and flour.
- **3.** Cream the sugar and oil. Add the eggs; beat well. Add the vinegar and food coloring: beat well.
- **4.** Sift together the dry ingredients. Add to the wet mixture, alternating with the buttermilk. Add the vanilla; beat well.
- **5.** Divide the batter between the pans. Bake 30-35 minutes.
- **6.** For frosting: Cream together the butter and cream cheese; add the vanilla and sugar. Mix well.
- **7.** Add 3/4 cup of pecans.
- **8.** Frost the cake. Use the remaining pecans to garnish the top of the cake.

#### **Granny Gray's Coconut Pie**

3 large eggs

I stick salted butter, melted

- 1 5-oz. can Carnation evaporated milk
- $1 \, 1/2$  cups sugar
- 2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 1 7-oz. bag Baker's coconut
- 3 Tbsp. all-purpose flour
- 1 20-oz. can crushed pineapple, drained
- 2 deep-dish piecrusts (Ritz brand or homemade)
- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 F.
- **2.** In a mixing bowl, lightly beat the eggs. Add the melted butter, milk, sugar and vanilla extract; blend well. Add the coconut and flour; mix well. Add the pineapple; stir.
- **3.** Equally divide the mixture between the 2 piecrusts.
- **4.** Bake 30-40 minutes, or until the pies and crusts are golden brown.

## Camille's Kitchen Butter Pound Cake

I cup unsalted butter, softened

2 cups sugar, sifted

5 eggs, separated

I tsp. vanilla extract

1 cup Carnation evaporated milk

2 cups all-purpose flour, sifted

I tsp. baking powder

I tsp. salt

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 F.
- **2.** Cream the butter, sugar, egg yolks and vanilla on high speed until light and fluffy.
- **3.** Add the evaporated milk, flour, baking powder and salt. Blend on low speed to moisten the flour; then mix on medium speed until the batter is smooth.
- **4.** In a separate cold metal or glass bowl, beat the egg whites until stiff but not dry. Fold them into the batter by hand, very lightly but thoroughly.
- 5. Pour the batter into an ungreased 10-inch tube baking pan. Bake 50-60 minutes until golden brown. Note: This cake may fall if the oven door is opened during the baking process. Open the oven door gently when the baking process is complete. Invert and cool in the baking pan on a baking rack.

## Phillip's Favorite Sweet Potato Pie

- 4 medium whole sweet potatoes, unpeeled
- 3 large eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 5-oz. can Carnation evaporated milk
- I stick salted butter, melted
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 3 Tbsp. all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. nutmeg
- 2 deep-dish piecrusts (Ritz brand or homemade)



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- 1/2 tsp. salt
  1/4 tsp. white pepper
- 2 cups Parmesan cheese, freshly shaved or grated
- **1.** In a large pan, melt the butter; add the cream. Simmer over low heat for 2 minutes.
- **2.** Whisk in the garlic, Italian seasoning, salt and pepper for 1 minute.
- **3.** Whisk in the Parmesan cheese until melted.

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 F.
- **2.** Boil the sweet potatoes until soft. Peel and discard the skin.
- **3.** In a mixing bowl, mash the sweet potatoes; allow to cool. Add the eggs, milk, butter, sugar and vanilla extract; mix well. Add the flour, cinnamon and nutmeg; blend well.
- **4.** Equally divide the mixture between the 2

piecrusts. Bake 30-40 minutes, or until the pies and crusts are golden brown.

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
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## Financial Considerations for Caregivers

Caring for aging parents is a challenge many of us will contend with in the coming years. Whether they're facing health problems or still enjoying a comfortable retirement, your parents may need your help eventually. Caregiving can be a difficult experience under any circumstances, as it's a situation rife with complex emotions intertwined with financial and legal considerations. While it may feel unnecessary now, putting in some work proactively can help ensure you and your family are prepared to give your parents the care they need when the time comes.

Here are four key areas to consider and discuss with your family before you're forced to make urgent decisions.

**I. Financial assets:** Work with your parents to get a complete picture of their various banking and investment accounts. Additionally, organize their passwords in a safe place, and consider asking them to add your name to their accounts, so you can help manage the funds if necessary. For simplicity, now may be a good time to consolidate their assets under one or two financial providers. Online tools like Frost's Wealth Connect make it easy to keep track of multiple accounts on a single screen.

2. Health insurance: Health care costs often amount to seniors' biggest


spending category, so it's important to understand your parents' insurance coverages. Help them evaluate Medicare Advantage plans and make the most of preventive care and prescription benefits. If they qualify for Medicaid, be aware that some states have resources to provide financial assistance for family caregivers.

- **3. Living arrangements:** Do you anticipate that your elderly parent(s) may move in with you, relocate to an assisted living community or require the 24/7 care of a nursing home? Consider whether they (and/or you) are in a financial position to cover these costs and look into long-term care insurance or annuities to help offset future expenses. Keep in mind that certain caregiving expenses may be tax deductible.
- 4. Estate planning: Consult an attorney to draft appropriate estate planning documents for your parents. Those could include a health care directive, which ensures medical providers carry out their wishes if they become incapacitated, and/or powers of attorney, which give you the right to make certain decisions on their behalf. They should also have an updated will, and business owners should have a clear succession plan.

Serving as your parents' financial protector can be one of your greatest contributions as a caregiver.


